Seminar on Health Disparities: The Case of Tobacco

Time, Location and Format: The seminar sessions occur on the first or second Wednesday of the month during the academic year, from 3:30-5:00 PM. All sessions are located in the UW School of Social Work, 4101 15th Ave NE, Seattle, WA 98105, in room 305 (School of Social Work Commons). The format for sessions includes a brief presentation by the speaker followed by discussion with seminar participants. All seminar sessions are free and open to the community. Brief Description: The seminar sessions integrate multiple disciplinary perspectives to address the pressing issue of disproportionate tobacco use and related diseases among marginalized populations. National and local experts will address topics such as 1) differential explanations for tobacco use and possible interventions in groups defined by socioeconomic status, race/ethnicity and sexual orientation, 2) the link between mental illness and smoking, 3) social stress theory and tobacco use, 4) acculturation processes and tobacco use, 5) the genetics of tobacco use, and 6) social deviance and tobacco use.

Graduate Credit: Graduate students from all disciplines who have an interest in health disparities and/or tobacco prevention, research or policy may receive I credit per quarter for attendance and participation at 3 seminars.
