

Dr. Tetsuden Kashima Awarded the James D. Clowes Award

Dr. Tetsuden (Tetsu) Kashima, American Ethnic Studies, has been awarded the James D. Clowes Award for the Advancement of Learning Communities. Established in 2003, this award was created to recognize the innovative contributions to teaching and learning by a member of the university community. Named for Professor James D. Clowes, a leader of the Comparative History of Ideas Program and a member of the Henry Jackson School of International Studies, the award recognizes a faculty or staff member who transforms undergraduate learning by creating or sustaining learning communities among students.

Dr. Kashima received his B.A. from the University of California (UC), Berkeley, and his Ph. D. in Sociology from UC, San Diego. He came to the University of Washington as the Director of Asian American Studies in 1976 and is currently a Professor in the University of Washington's Department of American Ethnic Studies and an Adjunct Professor in the Department of Sociology. He has been an invited professor at Ryukoku University, Kyoto, and the Yamaguchi National University in Yamaguchi, Japan. His publications include: *Buddhism in America: The Social Organization of an Ethnic Religious Institution* and *Judgment Without Trial: Japanese American Imprisonment during World War II*.
