BOARD OF REGENTS University of Washington

July 21, 2005

The Board of Regents held its regular meeting on Thursday, July 21, 2005, beginning at 3:00 p.m. in the Peterson Room of the Allen Library. The notice of the meeting was appropriately provided to the public and the press.

CALL TO ORDER

ROLL CALL

CONFIRM AGENDA

The agenda was confirmed as presented.

REPORT OF THE CHAIR OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS: Regent Brotman

Fee-Based Education at the University of Washington (Information only) BP–1

Dr. David P. Szatmary, Vice Provost for Educational Outreach, presented an overview of fee-based education. Among the areas he focused on were the structure and mission of Educational Outreach, advantages of fee-based degree programs, strategic directions for growth, policy issues and initiatives for the future.

Report from the Vice President/Vice Provost for Diversity (Information only) BP-2

Dr. Nancy V. (Rusty) Barceló, Vice President and Vice Provost for Diversity, highlighted the progress of the Diversity Appraisal. Her presentation was a follow-up to her remarks at the Academic and Student Affairs Committee meeting on June 4, 2004. She distributed the Diversity Appraisal Report Update, dated January 25, 2005. The document offers a set of significant observations, challenges and priority recommendations. She reported that the President's Diversity Appraisal Implementation Fund has awarded \$400,000 to 13 different campus units for innovative project that will enhance student development, enhance faculty diversity or improve the campus, workplace or classroom climate.

Joining Dr. Barceló was Dr. David Takeuchi, Professor and Dean of the School of Social Work. Dr. Takeuchi recently assumed the position of interim director of the University of Washington Diversity Research Institute. Dr. Takeuchi indicated that the Diversity Research Institute aims to support a stronger academic research climate in three significant ways: (1) institutional research; (2) faculty collaboration and; (3) by exploring questions about diversity that are raised by the broader society.

REPORT OF THE UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT: Dr. Emmert

Dr. Emmert announced that the University of Washington would be notifying the National Institutes of Allergy and Infectious Disease (NIAID) that the University will not pursue further its proposal for a Regional Biocontainment Laboratory (RBL). NIAID asked the University to respond very quickly on two weeks notice to technical and financial questions to ensure that if the RBL is offered to the University that it could support it. At this time, the University is not in a position financially to do so. The University will notify the NIAID of such, which will likely result in the University of Washington's proposal being rejected.

As the July Board meeting was Professor G. Ross. Heath, Chair of the Faculty Senate and ex-officio representative to the Board, President Emmert thanked him and said that he had been a wonderful colleague and partner. Dr. Emmert announced that the incoming Chair of the Faculty Senate is Dr. Ashley F. Emery, Professor of Mechanical Engineering. Professor Emery will assume his new responsibility on August 1, 2005.

President Emmert then introduced Mr. John Buller, Executive Director of the Alumni Association. Dr. Emmert said that Mr. Buller's presentation was in response to an interest expressed by the Regents.

Integrated Alumni Development Approach

Mr. John Buller, Executive Director of the University of Washington Alumni Association, first recognized Ms. Karen Turner-Lee, Washington State Commissioner of the Employment Securities Department and President of the Alumni Association, for her leadership over the past year. He introduced Mr. Chuck Blumenfeld, Attorney, Perkins Coie, as the incoming President, effective August 1.

Mr. Buller then focused his remarks on the relationship between the Alumni Association and the Office of Development Advancement Services. The two most important tools utilized to engage alumni and prospective alumni are the strategic methods of communication and the wide range of programs. Communications primarily are focused at proactive, preplanned agenda of what people care most about: (1) academic enrichment, (2) service to others, (3) career programs and (4) fun. Programs range from serving pizza to students during finals week to traveling abroad. In closing, Mr. Buller

noted the importance of President Emmert's belief in the power and relevance of an integrated Alumni/Development approach.

<u>Creation of a New Operating Fee Waiver for Certain Graduate and Professional Students</u> (Agenda no. F–6)

It was the recommendation of the administration and the Finance, Audit and Facilities Committee that the Board of Regents establish, under the authority granted by RCW 28B.15.915, an operating fee waiver for certain nonresident graduate and professional students. This operating fee waiver is being proposed to eliminate a potential competitive disadvantage in recruiting top-quality graduate and professional students.

Under this operating fee waiver, beginning Autumn Quarter 2005, any graduate or professional student who has lived in the State for one year (except for students whose visa status precludes them from establishing permanent residency) will be eligible for an annual waiver of a portion of operating fees equal to the difference between resident and nonresident tuition. This operating fee waiver will be granted if the student has applied for but failed to qualify for residency under the requirements specified in WAC 250-18-03 but meets the following criteria:

the student signs a statement that they have the intent to establish permanent residency in Washington;

the student has either a Washington State Driver's License or a Washington State Identification Card;

the student is registered to vote, if eligible to vote;

the student has established a bank account under a Washington state address;

if the student owns or drives a vehicle in Washington, it is registered in Washington;

the student maintains any medical/automobile insurance independent of parents; and

the student establishes that he or she is financially independent for the current and prior calendar years.

The annual operating fee waiver will include summer quarter. Students must file a residency application annually to either become reclassified or to establish eligibility for this operating fee waiver.

Regent Gates indicated that the Committees reviewed the UW Medicine Review Committee Report – Achieving Excellence in Compliance.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE: Regent Brotman, Chair

Regent Brotman stated that the Committee of the Whole met in two executive sessions to consider the minimum price at which real estate will be offered for sale or lease when public knowledge regarding such consideration would cause a likelihood of decreased price.

REPORTS FROM EX OFFICIO REPRESENTATIVES TO THE BOARD OF REGENTS

ASUW President: Mr. Lee M. Dunbar

Regent Brotman extended a warm welcome to Mr. Dunbar. Mr. Dunbar expressed excitement in representing undergraduate students this coming year. He said he looks forward to working with the Regents and the administration and to continuing the spirit of student involvement from last year.

GPSS President: Mr. Adam Grupp

Mr. Grupp noted that the new Graduate and Professional Student Senate officers are getting acclimated and trained, noting that they are all looking forward to the coming school year.

Alumni Association President: Ms. Karen Lee

Regent Brotman noted that it was Ms. Lee's last meeting and thanked her for all her many contributions. Ms. Lee said that it had been a pleasure serving as the Alumni Association ex-officio representative to the Board. She also expressed appreciation on behalf of the Alumni Association for the ex-officio seat at the Board table and for being a part of one of the best Universities in the world.

Faculty Senate Chair: Professor G. Ross Heath

Professor Heath made a number of observations about the dynamics of the Board of Regents over his many years at the University. He said he deeply appreciated the role that the Regents play at the University of Washington. The Regents efforts are widely recognized amongst the faculty and particularly appreciated, even if faculty members don't say thank you often enough. He said he had been witness to many of the efforts over the years and was very grateful to be working with such a remarkable group.

At Regent Brotman's request, Professor Heath made a few remarks about President Emmert's first year. Professor Heath said that of the seventeen people he had reported to over the years, only two names stand out, one of which is President Emmert. He remarked that he had no idea of how enjoyable it would be to orient and work with President Emmert. He noted that at each of the monthly Faculty Senate meetings there is an opportunity for the University President to make a few remarks and to respond to open questions from the floor. During the past year, there has been no shortage of contentious topics on which President Emmert had been thoroughly grilled. In all cases, his responses were open, straight forward and graceful. This was highlighted in the final meeting of the year where one of the senators who had been one of President Emmert's more aggressive questioners, spontaneously stood up and thanked him for the way he had handled all the issues that had been brought to him. The Senate's response was to give President Emmert a standing ovation. Professor Health stated that this is something he has not seen in any other case in my fifty odd years in academia. He said he thinks the reason the faculty has responded so positively to President Emmert is because of Emmert's openness, the strength and consistency of his principles, and because his answers and positions do not waffle through time. President Emmert has an obvious commitment to and affection for the University of Washington. Now that President Emmert has been joined by the insitutions' new Provost, Dr. Phyllis M. Wise, the faculty

is even more enthusiastic, and expects to see University of Washington move from its current state of excellence to the next higher level over the next few years. Professor Health concluded his remarks by stating that the faculty is delighted that President Emmert is at the University of Washington and applauds the role of the Regents in making this possible.

Regent Brotman noted that it also was last meeting for Dr. David B. Thorud, Acting Provost and Dean Emeritus, and expressed the Board deep appreciation for his service. Regent Brotman said it had been wonderful having Dr. Thorud in the position of Acting Provost over the past several years.

BACKGROUND

Article 1, Section 1, of the UW Medicine Board Bylaws states, "The UW Medicine Board shall consist of fifteen (15) members, including the VPMA/Dean, who shall serve as an *ex officio* member of the Board with full voice and vote. The Board members shall be appointed by the Board of Regents. At least one Board member shall be a member of the Board of Regents. One Board member shall be a member of the University nominated by the President of the University. The remaining twelve (12) Board members shall be nominated by the President of the University from among people who have broad public perspectives and do not represent any special interest group."

JoAnn Taricani is recommended for appointment to fill the vacancy on the UW Medicine Board resulting from Michael Halleran taking a new position at the University of Florida. Dr. Taricani is Associate Professor of Music History. She received her Master's degree in American Music History in 1977 and her doctorate in Renaissance Music History in 1986 from the University of Pennsylvania. Professor Taricani is a tireless member of the campus community and has served as a Faculty Legislative Representative, Deputy Legislative Representative, a member of the President's Task Force on Enrollment, Faculty Senate, Faculty Council, President's Task Force on Public Service and Outreach, Chair of the Academic Advisory Committee on Facilities and Special Committee on Legislative Matters, in addition to a wide range of other school and college committees. It is recommended that Dr. Taricani be appointed as the faculty

representative to the UW Medicine Board for a three-year term ending June 31, 2008.

Under the Bylaws of the UW Medicine Board it states that "the term of office of each appointed Board member shall be three years. No appointed Board member may serve more than three successive three-year terms...".

Sylvia M. Mathews, chief operating officer and executive director of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. She oversees finances, administration, legal affairs, advocacy, public affairs, and three of the Gates Foundation's areas of giving: Pacific Northwest program, special projects, and libraries. Before moving to Seattle in 2001, she was deputy director of the Office of Management and Budget in the Clinton administration and from 1997 to 1998 was assistant to the president and deputy chief of staff in the White House. Ann Ramsay-Jenkins is co-founder and Vice President & Treasurer of the Washington Education Foundation which provides college scholarships and mentoring to low-income, high potential students across the state. She has served two terms as a member of Washington's Higher Education Coordinating Board, has chaired the United Way of King County Board, the Seattle Repertory Theatre Board of Trustees, and was founding Chairman of the Seattle Repertory Theatre Foundation. She is also active in a number of other civic, professional and community organizations. Ann's professional experience includes a five-year stint as Director of the Office of Budgets at Harvard University, as Assistant Secretary of Administration & Finance for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, and as a Management Associate in the Office of Management & Budget, Executive Office of the President, in Washington D.C. Ann was appointed a White House Fellow in 1972 and served in the Executive Office of the President, Office of Drug Abuse Prevention where she received the Distinguished Service Award in 1973. She is a graduate of Skidmore College in New Hampshire. It is recommended that Ms. Ramsay-Jenkins be appointed a one-year term to finish out her tenure as Chair ending June 31, 2006.

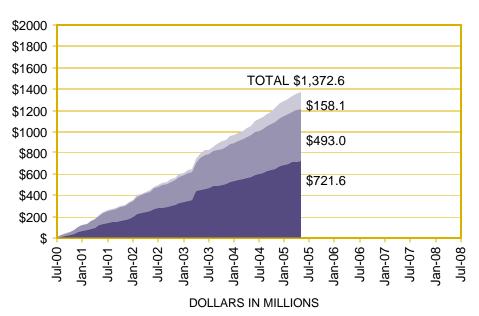
\$1,372,639,440 has been raised toward our campaign goal of \$2 billion.

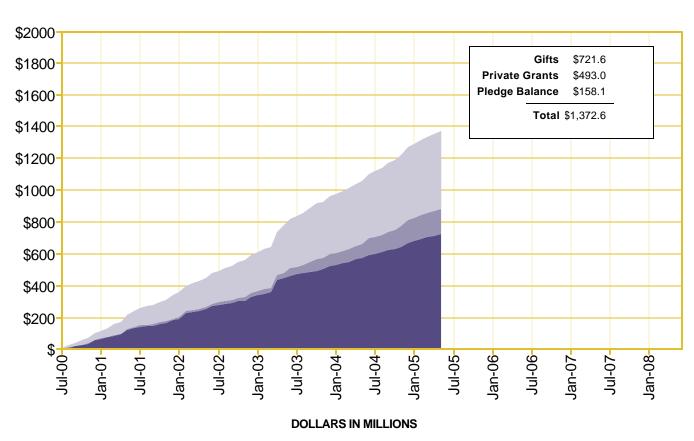

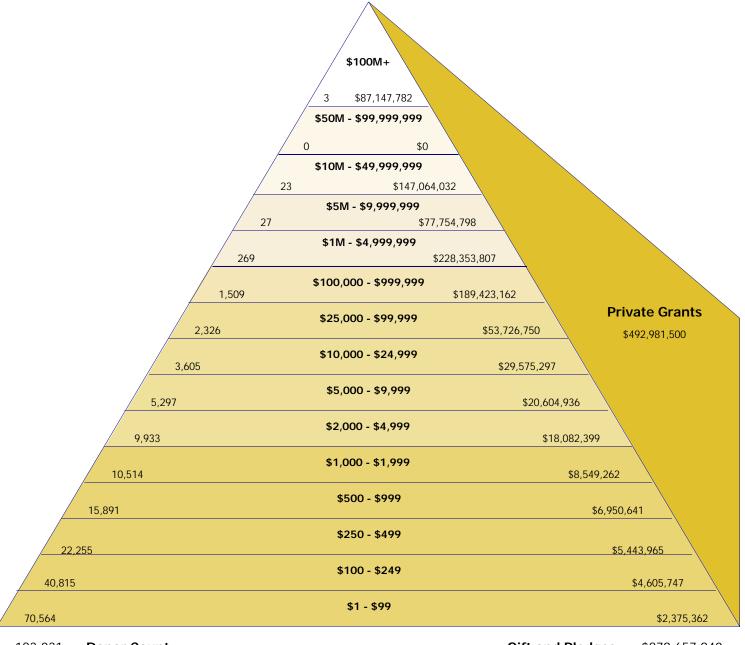

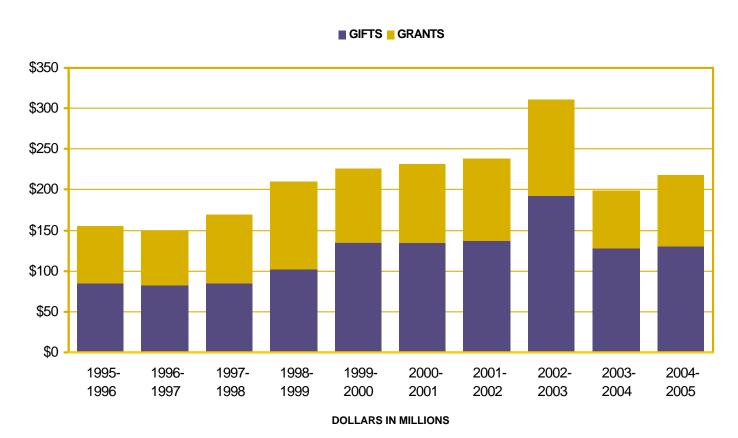

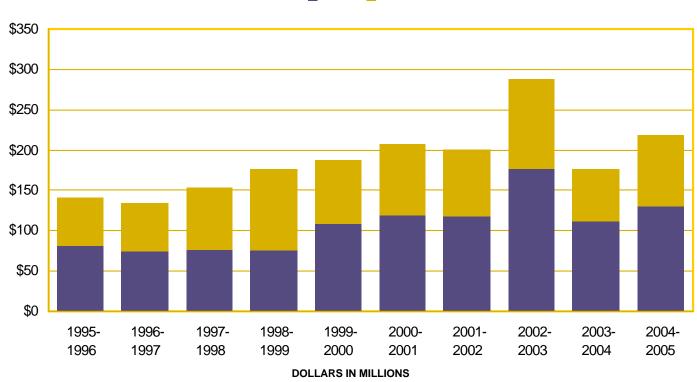

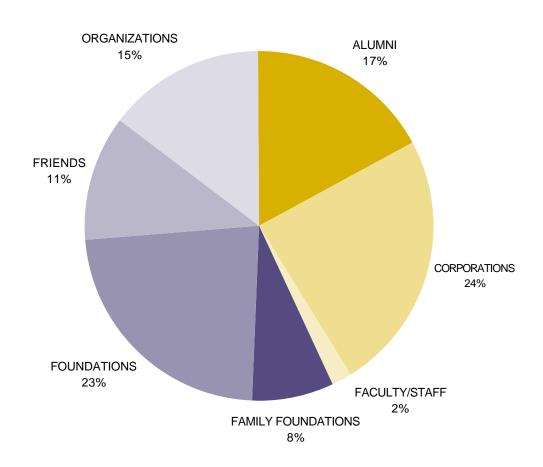

MAY HIGHLIGHTS

The United States Army Medical Research and Materiel Command awarded a grant in the amount of \$433,565 for a project under the direction of Professor Patrick S. Stayton of the Bioengineering Department entitled "Smart Polymeric Carriers for Enhanced Antisense Breast Cancer Therapy." This research involves the design and synthesis of "smart" polymer carriers that direct and enhance the intracellular delivery of therapeutic antisense oligodeoxynucleotides (ASODN) in breast cancer cells leading to significantly enhanced breast cancer therapy. The hypothesis is that this delivery method will cause cell death, regression of tumor size and increase survival rates.

The Health Resources and Services Administration awarded a three year renewal grant in the amount of \$676,192 for a project under the direction of Assistant Dean David A. Acosta of the School Of Medicine entitled "Health Careers Opportunities Program (HCOP)." The goal of this program is to assist individuals from disadvantaged background to enter and graduate from a health or allied health professional program. It also helps transition entering medical students into the medical school curriculum. The HCOP supports a comprehensive regional approach to health careers recruitment and retention in the states of Washington, Wyoming, Alaska, Montana and Idaho.

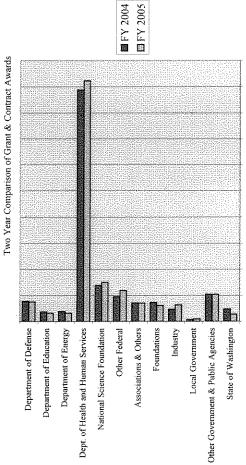

ACTIONS TAKEN UNDER DELEGATED AUTHORITY Reported to the Finance, Audit & Facilities Committee July 21, 2005

Pursuant to the Standing Orders of the Board of Regents, Delegation of Authority, and to the delegation of authority from the President of the University to the Executive Vice President in Executive Order No. 1, to take action for projects or contracts that exceed \$1,000,000 in value or cost but are less than \$5,000,000, the Administration may approve and execute all instruments.

Part I: Report of Actions Taken Under General Delegated Authority

Project Name: Red Square Seismic Joint Repairs – Project No. 10311 Action Reported: Contract Award and a Budget Decrease of more than 10%

On June 30, 2005 a construction contract was awarded to David L Sack Construction Co. Inc., in the amount of \$328,143 for the Red Square Seismic Joint Repairs project. Two bids were received for the project the low bid was \$328,143 and the high bid was \$410,350. David L Sack has completed H-Wing Minus 2 Lift Station on campus. David L Sack has also completed other projects outside the University including seismic improvements to seven Seattle schools, monorail pedestrian bridge and Lynnwood wastewater improvements. The project budget has been reestablished at \$592,069.

The base scope of the project was to replace the leaking seismic joint adjoining Meany Hall and the Central Parking Garage, repair the rusted HVAC plenum in the Meany Hall basement mechanical room and repair the leaking joint at the Kane Hall columns. Repairing the seismic joints adjoining Odegaard Undergraduate Library and Kane Hall to the Central Parking garage were packaged as bid alternates.

The original budget of \$1,070,000 included funds for the design and construction of the bid alternate work. Funding from the 2005-2007 biennium was less than requested so the alternates were not awarded. The project budget is reduced from \$1,070,000 to \$592,069 to reflect the current scope. Construction is anticipated to begin in mid-July 2005 and be complete in November 2005. Repair of the bid alternate areas is expected to occur in the 07-09 biennium in a new project.

Funding is from Building Renewal State funds from the 2003-2005 and 2005-2007 bienniums.

Project Name: Raitt & Savery Hall Masonry Abatement Project No: 10441 Action Reported: Contract Award and Budget Decrease of more than 10%

On June 20, 2005 a construction contract was awarded to Extreme Coatings, Inc., (ECI) in the amount of \$906,404 for the Raitt Hall Masonry Abatement project. Six bids were received for the project. The low bid was \$\$906,404 and the high bid was \$1,393,500. ECI recently completed a project at Fresno Dam, in Havre, Montana which renovated the gatehouse listed on the National Registry of Historic Places. This gatehouse project included hazardous coatings removal and asbestos abatement similar to the Raitt Hall project. ECI has also performed coatings removal on all kinds of projects including potable water reservoirs, dam structures, and bridges over water, and public buildings for Gifford Pinchot National Forest. The project budget has been reestablished at \$2,205,000.

The original scope of this project was to abate the existing terra cotta, brick, and stone facades of the 1916 Raitt Hall, 1917-1920 Savery Hall. An existing asbestos containing coating applied to the Raitt and Savery Halls in the 1950's has failed and must be removed to facilitate future renovation and continued building maintenance. The project was originally also to restore the landscape for both buildings.

During design, the University did receive planning funds as part of the 2005-2007 biennium capital budget for Savery Hall. The decision was made to transfer the Savery Hall abatement and landscape work from this project to the Savery Hall building renovation project.

The project scope now includes abatement of the existing facade at Raitt Hall, as well as waterproofing and landscaping at Raitt Hall. The original project budget of \$3,600,000 is now reestablished at \$2,205,000. Funding is available from the 2004 Supplemental Capital Budget.

Construction activity for the ECI construction contract is anticipated to start in July 2005 and be complete in January 2006.

Sand Point Building 25 Core and Shell Project No. 200787 Action Reported: Architect Appointment and Establish Project Budget

On June 23, 2005 a contract for Architectural services was awarded to ARC Architects, for the Sand Point Building 25 Core and Shell/Demolition and Abatement project. ARC Architects has completed multiple projects at Sand Point, Harborview, and the Seattle Campus. The project budget has been established at \$1,621,866.

This project will demolish the interior of Building 25 at Sand Point and upgrades the exterior of the building. Building 25 is a 4 story building (basement included) of approximately 28,050 gross square feet that was constructed in 3 phases between 1927 and 1940. Building 25 is historically significant; certain interior elements including interior hallways on the first floor will be retained. The interior demolition will include removal of existing mechanical, electrical, plumbing, communication systems and non-structural partitions and hazardous materials. The project will also include the demolition and installation of a new roof as well as cleaning and sealing of the masonry and window replacement at the basement and third floor.

When completed, this project will make the core and shell of Building 25 ready for future tenant improvement work. Discussions are underway with academic units to determine the program for the tenant improvement project. A future project will be established to provide the tenant improvements to the building.

This project budget is \$1,621,866 which is to be funded in phases with the initial funding by UW Central Funds for the design phase. Additional funding from UW central funds will be necessary to perform the demolition and exterior improvement work.

Demolition and exterior improvements are anticipated to start in February 2006 and be complete in August 2006 subject to future funding.

Johnson Hall QRC Freezers, Project No. 10559 Action Reported - Contract Award and Budget Increase

On April 14, 2005 a construction contract was awarded to Western Ventures Construction, Inc. in the amount of \$1,020,000 for the Johnson Hall QRC Freezers project. Three bids were received for the project, and the range between the bids was \$1,020,000 to \$1,090,000. Western Ventures is a local general contractor based out of Mountlake Terrace, WA. They have successfully completed numerous projects at the University of Washington. The project budget has been reestablished at \$1,669,000.

This project is for the replacement and renovation of the Johnson Hall QRC Freezers refrigeration systems. This work includes replacing the individual refrigeration compressor with a central plant, replacing the freezers fan-coil (evaporators) within the freezers, providing a rated enclosure around the new refrigeration compressor and providing code required ventilation and refrigeration monitoring. The renovated freezers will be provided with ventilation air from a medical air rated compressor. All electrical service will be upgraded to meet current code requirements. The project is anticipated to be completed by September 9, 2005.

The approved project budget was \$1,391,116. During design, the scope was increased to coordinate tie-in with the main Johnson Hall Renovation project and to accommodate the low velocity air flow requirements of the Department of Earth and Space Sciences. The forecast cost of the project at time of bid was \$1,500,000 to account for these scope changes and material cost escalation. Additional funding was received to allow award of the base contract and bid Alternate No. 2 to relocate an existing wall, taking the project budget to \$1,669,000. Funding is available from Program Renewal funds.

Part II: Report of Actions Taken Under Specific Delegated Authority

Savery Hall Renovation Action Reported: Architect Appointment

In June 2005, authority was delegated to the President to award design contracts for the Clark Hall Renovation project. SRG Partnership, Inc., was recommended as the most qualified firm by the Architectural Commission as described below. It is intended that this project will be brought back to the Board of Regents in November, near the end of the predesign activity, to request approval to establish the budget, request use of an alternative public works contracting method, and request delegated authority to award the construction contract.

Savery Hall, located on the Arts and Sciences Quadrangle of the Seattle campus, was built in two phases. The north structure was built in 1916 and the south addition in 1919. Savery Hall is a major instructional building with 35 percent of its assignable area used as classrooms. There are 25 general assignment classrooms in Savery Hall, with a total of 1,025 seats. Savery Hall houses the College of Arts and Sciences' Departments of Economics, Philosophy, and Sociology, and also provides space for the Center of Social Science Computation and Research (CSSCR), a computer resource center that provides facilities and support of all the social science units. The project is proposed to renew the facility for the current occupants.

Savery Hall has been identified as one of the most critical renovation projects on the Seattle Campus. A comprehensive remodel will be required of most of the building's occupied areas. The project scope is proposed to include correction of seismic deficiencies, as well as a replacement of the electrical, lighting, mechanical, and communications systems. Adding a second elevator, replacement of the existing elevator, modifications to restrooms, ramping and other access improvements will also be included in the renovation to bring this heavily used instructional building into current ADA compliance. The current project scope and budget includes an additional 10,000 assignable square feet, in the current unused attic space.

On April 28, 2005, the Capital Projects Office advertised for firms interested in providing architectural services for the Savery Hall Renovation project. Ten firms submitted qualifications, and on June 2, 2005, a selection committee identified three finalists for interviews. The selection committee included the College of Arts and Sciences, Classroom Support Services, Capital and Space Planning Office, Capital Projects Office and a Board member from the Seattle Chapter of the AIA. On June 20-21, 2005 the Architectural Commission conducted interviews and recommended that SRG Partnership be appointed design architect for this project.

SRG Partnership Inc. is an architectural design firm with offices in Portland, OR and Seattle, WA. The primary team members have worked together extensively on similar complex renovation projects as well as other major public projects. SRG was selected for its in-depth knowledge of academic buildings and their extensive experience in building renovations, especially the Washington State Legislative Building. This firm has a proven track record in the responsive use of State funding, successful pre-design reports, and LEED certified projects.

The preliminary project budget is \$64,127,000. Funding has been approved by the State Legislature for the pre-design phase and has been appropriated for the design phase, which funds are contingent upon receipt of an acceptable pre-design report by the end of 2005. Construction funding will be requested in the 07-09 biennium.

Clark Hall Renovation Action Reported: Architect Appointment

In June 2005, authority was delegated to the President to award design contracts for the Clark Hall Renovation project. Mahlum Architects was recommended as the most qualified firm by the Architectural Commission as described below. It is intended that this project will be brought back to the Board of Regents in November, near the end of the predesign activity, to request approval to establish the budget, request use of an alternative public works contracting method, and request delegated authority to award the construction contract.

Clark Hall, constructed in 1896, is one of the oldest buildings on the Seattle campus. It is on the Washington Heritage Register and originally served as the women's dormitory building and now houses instructional programs for the Navy, Army and Air Force students pursuing a University of Washington degree. The building has 30,568 gross square feet and is primarily used for instructional space and offices, including three general assignment classrooms with a total of 85 stations, one class laboratory, and three computer laboratories.

The project scope will include correction of seismic deficiencies of this wood frame masonry building. The renovation will include upgrading all major building systems, correcting seismic deficiencies, improving accessibility, including adding an elevator, addressing life and safety code conditions, performing asbestos abatement, and providing updated facilities for instructional programs. All electrical, lighting, mechanical, and communications systems will be replaced and the windows and doors will be upgraded to correct code deficiencies and reduce operating costs. An elevator will be added to this

three-story building and access to restrooms throughout the building will be improved to bring the facility into current ADA compliance. The building exterior will be completely renewed to stop the water infiltration currently penetrating the masonry walls. A major renovation will also allow for changes that make more efficient use of the existing space.

On April 28, 2005, the Capital Projects Office advertised for firms interested in providing architectural services for the Clark Hall Renovation project. Eight firms submitted qualifications and on May 31, 2005, a selection committee identified three finalists for interviews. The selection committee included representatives from CASPO, Classroom Support Services, Naval Science, Capital Projects Office and the University's Architectural Advisor. On June 20-21, 2005 the Architectural Commission conducted interviews and recommended that Mahlum Architects be appointed design architect for this project.

Mahlum Architects has worked on 14 projects on the University's campus, including the Suzallo Library Renovation and the William H. Gates School of Law. They have performed 15 pre-design studies for the State of Washington, with 14 having received funding and one currently being reviewed. They are experienced both in renovation and new construction, and have completed a wide variety of projects for higher education clients in the region.

The preliminary project budget is \$18,300,000. Funding has been approved by the State Legislature for the pre-design phase and has been appropriated for the design phase, which funds are contingent upon receipt of an acceptable pre-design report by the end of 2005. Construction funding will be requested in the 07-09 biennium

Playhouse Theater Renovation Action Reported: Architect Appointment

In June 2005, authority was delegated to the President to award design contracts for the Playhouse Theater Renovation project. LMN Architects was recommended as the most

qualified firm by the Architectural Commission as described below. It is intended that this project will be brought back to the Board of Regents in November, near the end of the predesign activity, to request approval to establish the budget, and request delegated authority to award the construction contract.

It is intended that this project will be brought back to the Board of Regents in November, near the end of the pre-design activity, to request approval to establish the budget, and request delegated authority to award the construction contract.

The Playhouse Theater, constructed in 1931 and substantially renovated in 1968, is a one story brick building with a small partial basement totaling 10,137 gross square feet and a seating capacity of just over 200. The Playhouse Theater is assigned to the School of Drama, one of the most renowned drama departments in the United States. The facility is a mainstay of its teaching program and offers students an intensively used venue to stage at least two productions a quarter. Because this heavily used theater is wood framed construction with un-reinforced brick, it poses seismic stability concerns in the event of a major earthquake. Despite the building's intense use, the antiquated infrastructure also makes the building difficult to use for instruction and performances. For example, the heating and ventilation systems are in such poor condition that patrons often complain and students are forced to rehearse with gloves and coats on in winter.

The renovation will include upgrading all major building systems; improving accessibility, seismic resistance, and life and safety code conditions; performing asbestos abatement; and providing updated facilities for theater instruction and performance. Disability access will be improved to bring the building into current ADA compliance.

On April 28, 2005, the Capital Projects Office advertised for firms interested in providing architectural services for the Playhouse Theater Renovation project. Nine firms submitted qualifications and on June 2, 2005, a selection committee identified three finalists for interviews. The selection committee included representatives from the UW School of Drama, Capital Projects Office, CASPO, the College of Arts and Sciences and the University's Architectural Advisor. On June 21, 2005 the Architectural Commission conducted interviews and recommended that LMN Architects be appointed design architect for this project.

LMN Architects, established in Seattle in 1979, has grown to include a professional staff of approximately 100. The firm has designed and renovated more than 30 performance facilities, ranging in size from the \$800,000 Performing Arts Center Renovation @ Western Washington University to the \$90 million rebirth of the Seattle Opera House into Marion Oliver McCaw Hall @ Seattle Center. LMN has completed over 25 projects for the University of Washington, including Programming, Predesign and Design of a wide variety of facilities and building types.

The preliminary project budget is \$7,120,000. Funding has been approved by the State Legislature for the pre-design phase and has been appropriated for the design phase, which

funds are contingent upon receipt of an acceptable pre-design report by the end of 2005. Construction funding will be requested in the 07-09 biennium.

Normal Guidelines for Submitting Supplemental Budget Requests

Under the standard guidelines that the Office of Financial Management provides for supplemental budget requests, only requests that meet one or more of the following criteria will considered:

the request is the result of some sort of emergency situation;

the request results from an emergent situation that developed since the original biennial budget was adopted; and/or

the request results from some new regulatory requirement.

While these are the standard guidelines, state agencies often submit supplemental budget requests that technically do not meet these guidelines.

State Budget Context

The financial picture for the State General Fund is improving. In the June 2005 update of the State General Fund revenue forecast, expected revenues were increased by \$109 million for the 2003-05 biennium and increased by \$341 million of the 2005-07 biennium.

<u>Creation of a New Operating Fee Waiver for Certain Graduate and Professional Students</u>

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is the recommendation of the administration and the Finance, Audit and Facilities Committee that the Board of Regents establish, under the authority granted by RCW 28B.15.915, an operating fee waiver for certain nonresident graduate and professional students. This operating fee waiver is being proposed to eliminate a potential competitive disadvantage in recruiting top quality graduate and professional students.

Under this operating fee waiver, beginning Autumn Quarter 2005, any graduate or professional student who has lived in the State for one year (except for students whose visa status precludes them from establishing permanent residency) will be eligible for an annual waiver of a portion of operating fees equal to the difference between resident and nonresident tuition. This operating fee waiver will be granted if the student has applied for but failed to qualify for residency under the requirements specified in WAC 250-18-03 but meets the following criteria:

the student signs a statement that they have the intent to establish permanent residency in Washington;

the student has either a Washington State Driver's License or a Washington State Identification Card;

the student is registered to vote, if eligible to vote;

the student has established a bank account under a Washington state address;

if the student owns or drives a vehicle in Washington, it is registered in Washington;

the student maintains any medical/automobile insurance independent of parents; and

the student establishes that he or she is financially independent for the current and prior calendar years.

The annual operating fee waiver will include summer quarter. Students must file a residency application annually to either become reclassified or to establish eligibility for this operating fee waiver.

BACKGROUND

The University of Washington enrolls a substantial number of graduate and professional students from other states. These nonresident students are assessed higher tuition rates unless they are reclassified as a resident student or are granted a nonresident tuition waiver because they hold an eligible teaching or research assistant appointment. The Washington State Legislature has adopted residency requirements (RCW 28B.15.015) and the Higher Education Coordinating Board is responsible for specification of residency criteria through the Washington Administrative Code (WAC Chapter 250-18). The University must follow state law guidelines when determining a student's residency.

WAC Chapter 250-18 was amended in July 2003 to improve the standards for determining residency. The code changes affected undergraduate, graduate, and professional students. The amendments eliminated loopholes that some students had been using to qualify as residents. Ideally, graduate and professional students would have been exempted from the changes for reasons that are discussed below, but the state residency rules apply equally to all student categories.

While the revisions to the residency requirements that were implemented in 2003 made the State's policies for determining residency for undergraduate students comparable to those of other public universities, they imposed a higher standard for graduate and professional students to obtain residency than is common at other public universities with whom we compete for students. At the graduate and professional level, most other public universities allow non-resident graduate and professional students to be reclassified as residents for tuition and fee paying purposes after they have lived in the state for one year as long as they meet requirements similar to those listed on page 1. The UW's ability to compete successfully for top quality graduate and professional students will be enhanced if the UW establishes policies affecting cost of attendance that are consistent with those of institutions with whom we compete.

<u>Current Residency Requirements</u>. To be classified or reclassified as a resident, for tuition and fee purposes, a student must establish a bona fide domicile in the state of Washington "primarily for purposes other than educational" for a period

of one year. To establish a bona fide domicile, a student must satisfy all of the requirements listed on page 1. In addition, by state law, a nonresident student who is enrolled for more than 6 credits a quarter "will be presumed to be in the state of Washington for primarily educational purposes," which makes it much more difficult to establish residency. By agreement among the six public baccalaureate degree granting institutions in the state, the main way to overcome this "6 credit presumption" is by maintaining a 30 hour work week.

Recent Experience. It should be noted that most graduate and professional students applying for residency status under the new rules meet all of the requirements specified. In calendar year 2004, of the 556 graduate students who applied for resident status: 386 students (69%) met all of the requirements of WAC 250-18-030; 70 additional students (13%) likely would have qualified for residency status if they had either been employed full time during the previous year or had been enrolled for less than six credits; and 100 students (18%) failed to meet multiple requirements. In calendar year 2004, of the 106 professional students who applied for residency: 55 students (52%) met all of the requirements; 26 students (25%) likely would have qualified for residency status if they had either been employed full time during the previous year or had been enrolled for less than six credits; and 25 students (24%) failed to meet multiple requirements.

Since the 2003 rules implementation, the University has "grandfathered" the graduate and professional students under the residency requirements that were in effect at the time they entered the university.

Based upon the data from calendar year 2004 discussed above, the Office of Planning and Budgeting estimates that approximately 100 graduate and professional students per year will qualify for this proposed operating fee waiver and that approximately \$1,000,000 per year in operating fees will be waived. Because there is no offsetting State General Fund support provided for operating fee waivers granted under RCW 28B.15.915, this amount represents foregone revenue to the UW.

Recommended Changes. Graduate and professional student recruitment is of paramount importance to the University. As "cost of program" is one important consideration for graduate and professional students choosing which school to attend, we do not want to place the University of Washington at a competitive disadvantage by making the total cost of attending the UW significantly more expensive for graduate and professional students who have lived in the state for

more than a year than it is at competing programs at other public universities. Although exceptions cannot be made in the application of state residency policy, it is possible for the University to grant operating fee waivers to graduate and professional students who do not meet all of the residency requirements but do meet certain specific criteria that establish close connections to the state.

The element of residency requirements that most often prevents graduate and professional students from being classified as residents is the presumption in the requirements that if a student is enrolled for more than six credits a quarter, it is assumed that the student is in the state primarily for educational purposes. Many graduate and professional students cannot meet the 30 hour per week employment factor that is utilized in the residency requirements to overcome this presumption. Under the operating fee waiver established here, any graduate or professional student (except for students whose visa status precludes them from establishing permanent residency) who has lived in the state for at least one year, has applied for resident status and been turned down, and who meets all of the criteria listed on the first page would qualify for a waiver of a portion of operating fees equivalent to the nonresident tuition differential.

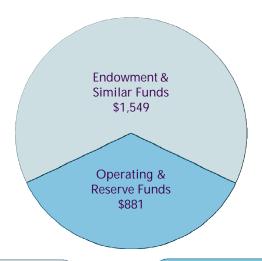






TREASURY ASSETS¹ as of 3/31/05-\$2.4 Billion

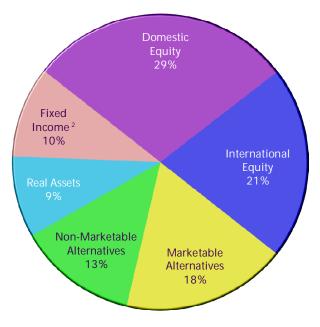






ASSET ALLOCATION As of March 31, 2005

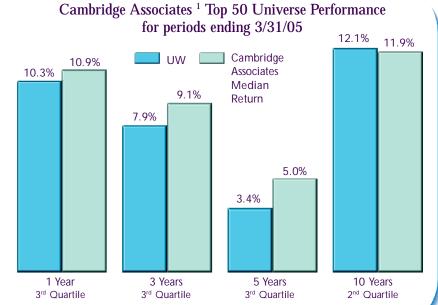

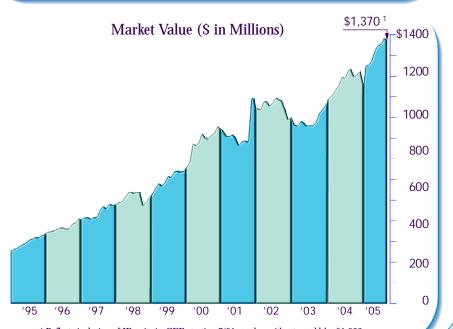

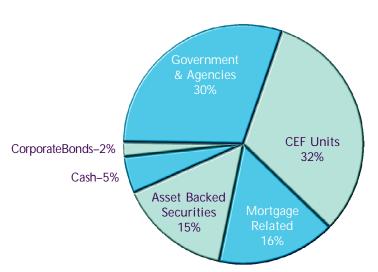

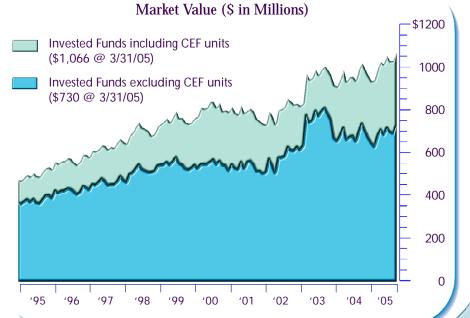

BACKGROUND

Article 1, Section 1, of the UW Medicine Board Bylaws states, "The UW Medicine Board shall consist of fifteen (15) members, including the VPMA/Dean, who shall serve as an *ex officio* member of the Board with full voice and vote. The Board members shall be appointed by the Board of Regents. At least one Board member shall be a member of the Board of Regents. One Board member shall be a member of the University nominated by the President of the University. The remaining twelve (12) Board members shall be nominated by the President of the University from among people who have broad public perspectives and do not represent any special interest group."

JoAnn Taricani is recommended for appointment to fill the vacancy on the UW Medicine Board resulting from Michael Halleran taking a new position at the University of Florida. Dr. Taricani is Associate Professor of Music History. She received her Master's degree in American Music History in 1977 and her doctorate in Renaissance Music History in 1986 from the University of Pennsylvania. Professor Taricani is a tireless member of the campus community and has served as a Faculty Legislative Representative, Deputy Legislative Representative, a member of the President's Task Force on Enrollment, Faculty Senate, Faculty Council, President's Task Force on Public Service and Outreach, Chair of the Academic Advisory Committee on Facilities and Special Committee on Legislative Matters, in addition to a wide range of other school and college committees. It is recommended that Dr. Taricani be appointed as the faculty

representative to the UW Medicine Board for a three-year term ending June 31, 2008.

Under the Bylaws of the UW Medicine Board it states that "the term of office of each appointed Board member shall be three years. No appointed Board member may serve more than three successive three-year terms...".

Sylvia M. Mathews, chief operating officer and executive director of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. She oversees finances, administration, legal affairs, advocacy, public affairs, and three of the Gates Foundation's areas of giving: Pacific Northwest program, special projects, and libraries. Before moving to Seattle in 2001, she was deputy director of the Office of Management and Budget in the Clinton administration and from 1997 to 1998 was assistant to the president and deputy chief of staff in the White House. Mathews earned a bachelor's degree in government, cum laude, from Harvard University in 1987 and a degree in philosophy, politics and economics as Rhodes Scholar at Oxford University in England. It is recommended that Ms. Mathews be appointed for a three-year term ending June 31, 2008.

Ann Ramsay-Jenkins is co-founder and Vice President & Treasurer of the Washington Education Foundation which provides college scholarships and mentoring to low-income, high potential students across the state. She has served two terms as a member of Washington's Higher Education Coordinating Board, has chaired the United Way of King County Board, the Seattle Repertory Theatre Board of Trustees, and was founding Chairman of the Seattle Repertory Theatre Foundation. She is also active in a number of other civic, professional and community organizations. Ann's professional experience includes a five-year stint as Director of the Office of Budgets at Harvard University, as Assistant Secretary of Administration & Finance for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, and as a Management Associate in the Office of Management & Budget, Executive Office of the President, in Washington D.C. Ann was appointed a White House Fellow in 1972 and served in the Executive Office of the President, Office of Drug Abuse Prevention where she received the Distinguished Service Award in 1973. She is a graduate of Skidmore College in New Hampshire. It is recommended that Ms. Ramsay-Jenkins be appointed a one-year term to finish out her tenure as Chair ending June 31, 2006.

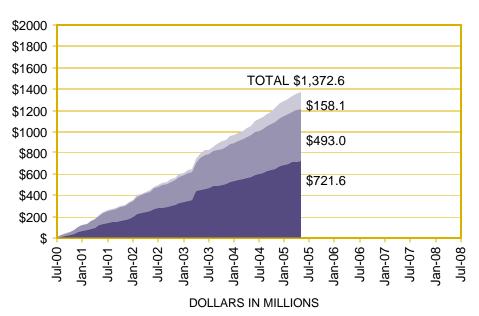
\$1,372,639,440 has been raised toward our campaign goal of \$2 billion.

Jennifer and Richard Beers — \$10,000 to UW Bothell

- This gift to the UW Bothell Computing & Software Systems Endowed Fund provides discretionary support to be used by the Director of the Computing & Software Systems degree program.
- Jennifer Beers ('03) and her husband Richard made the gift in honor of the faculty who helped and guided Jennifer during her time at UW Bothell. The gift is eligible for a match from Microsoft, where she works.
- Established in 1996, the Bachelor of Science in Computing and Software Systems degree program was designed by representatives of regional community colleges and high tech industries. The program prepares students for employment, graduate education and lifelong learning in the field of computer science.
- The Beers also support community-oriented agriculture, and co-founded a 47-acre organic, sustainable farm in the Sammamish Valley.

Robert and Micki Flowers — \$55,246 to the Graduate School and Intercollegiate Athletics

- Micki Flowers ('73) and Bob Flowers ('65) are UW Benefactors and extremely active members of the University of Washington community.
- Bob Flowers serves on the Campaign Committee for the Evans School of Public Affairs, and Micki is a
 member of the Graduate School's Campaign Committee and their Diversity Committee. She also serves as
 the Vice President for University Relations for the ARCS Foundation, which funds fellowships for UW and
 WSU students pursuing degrees in science, medicine and engineering.
- Their gift benefits the Micki & Bob Flowers ARCS Fellowship and the Flowers Endowed Graduate Student Award in Public Affairs which provides annual awards to three students each year, and the Crewhouse Renovation Fund, which they have pledged \$25,000 in support of.

Weyerhaeuser Company Foundation — \$400,000 to the College of Architecture and Urban Planning, the Business School, the College of Engineering, the College of Forest Resources, and UW Tacoma

- The Weyerhaeuser Company is a University of Washington Laureate. Established in 1900 in Federal Way, Washington, Weyerhaeuser is one of the world's largest integrated forest products companies. The company currently employs 55,000 people in 18 countries.
- In November 2004, the Weyerhaeuser Foundation made a \$2 million pledge in support of Campaign UW: Creating Futures, the University's eight-year, \$2 billion effort to raise funds in support of improved student access, recruitment and retention of faculty, and program and building enhancement.
- This gift represents payments on that pledge, including six endowed professorships/faculty support funds, three endowed scholarships, and an unrestricted venture capital fund for environmental research.

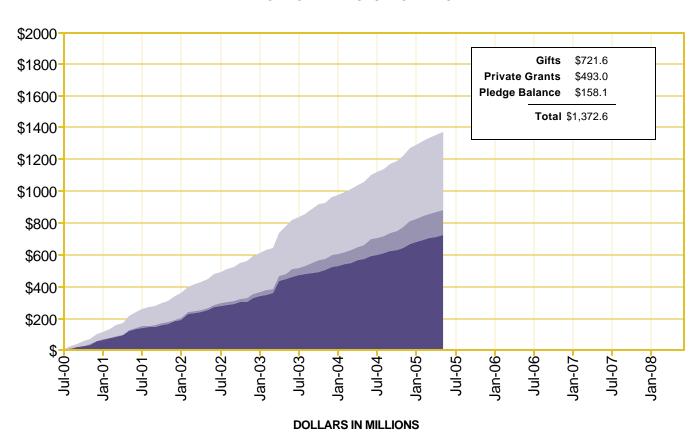

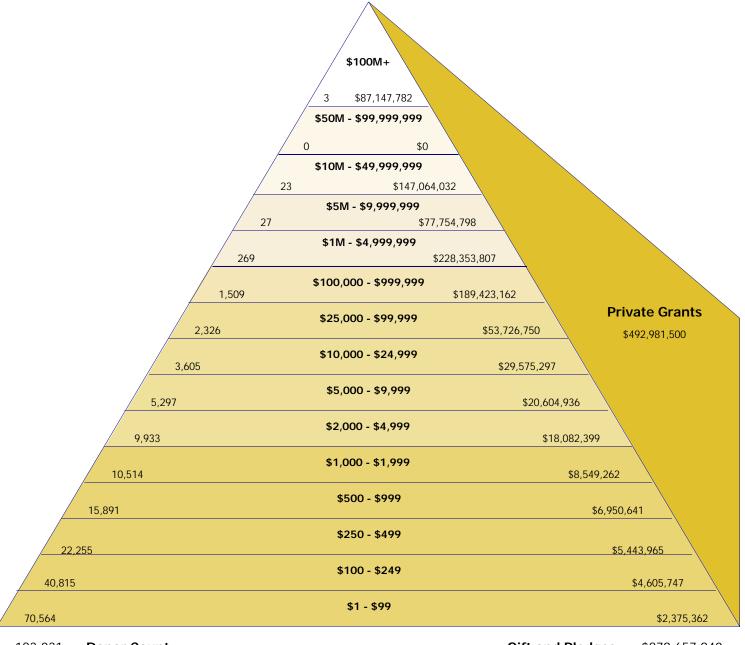

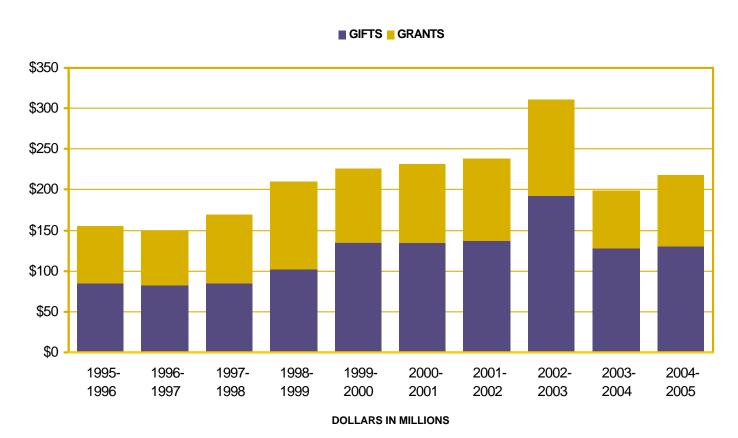

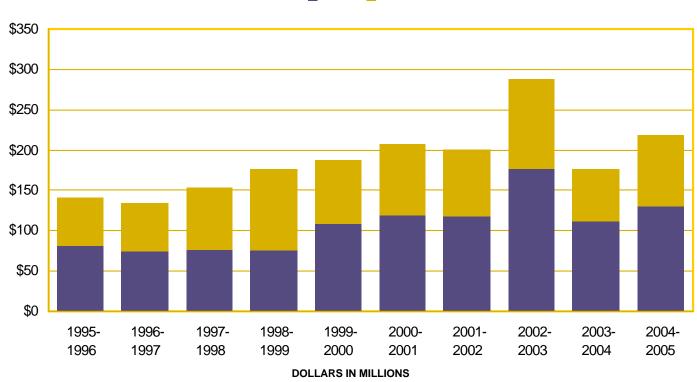

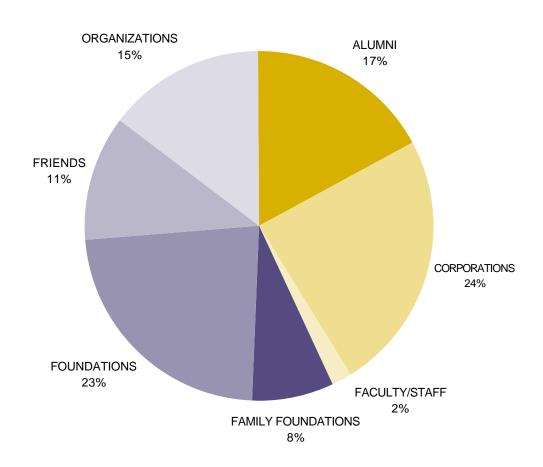

MAY HIGHLIGHTS

The United States Army Medical Research and Materiel Command awarded a grant in the amount of \$433,565 for a project under the direction of Professor Patrick S. Stayton of the Bioengineering Department entitled "Smart Polymeric Carriers for Enhanced Antisense Breast Cancer Therapy." This research involves the design and synthesis of "smart" polymer carriers that direct and enhance the intracellular delivery of therapeutic antisense oligodeoxynucleotides (ASODN) in breast cancer cells leading to significantly enhanced breast cancer therapy. The hypothesis is that this delivery method will cause cell death, regression of tumor size and increase survival rates.

The Health Resources and Services Administration awarded a three year renewal grant in the amount of \$676,192 for a project under the direction of Assistant Dean David A. Acosta of the School Of Medicine entitled "Health Careers Opportunities Program (HCOP)." The goal of this program is to assist individuals from disadvantaged background to enter and graduate from a health or allied health professional program. It also helps transition entering medical students into the medical school curriculum. The HCOP supports a comprehensive regional approach to health careers recruitment and retention in the states of Washington, Wyoming, Alaska, Montana and Idaho.

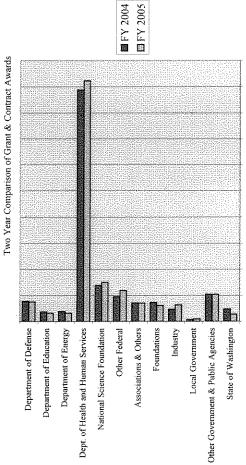

Pursuant to the Standing Orders of the Board of Regents, Delegation of Authority, and to the delegation of authority from the President of the University to the Executive Vice President in Executive Order No. 1, to take action for projects or contracts that exceed \$1,000,000 in value or cost but are less than \$5,000,000, the Administration may approve and execute all instruments.

Part I: Report of Actions Taken Under General Delegated Authority

Project Name: Red Square Seismic Joint Repairs – Project No. 10311 Action Reported: Contract Award and a Budget Decrease of more than 10%

On June 30, 2005 a construction contract was awarded to David L Sack Construction Co. Inc., in the amount of \$328,143 for the Red Square Seismic Joint Repairs project. Two bids were received for the project the low bid was \$328,143 and the high bid was \$410,350. David L Sack has completed H-Wing Minus 2 Lift Station on campus. David L Sack has also completed other projects outside the University including seismic improvements to seven Seattle schools, monorail pedestrian bridge and Lynnwood wastewater improvements. The project budget has been reestablished at \$592,069.

The base scope of the project was to replace the leaking seismic joint adjoining Meany Hall and the Central Parking Garage, repair the rusted HVAC plenum in the Meany Hall basement mechanical room and repair the leaking joint at the Kane Hall columns. Repairing the seismic joints adjoining Odegaard Undergraduate Library and Kane Hall to the Central Parking garage were packaged as bid alternates.

The original budget of \$1,070,000 included funds for the design and construction of the bid alternate work. Funding from the 2005-2007 biennium was less than requested so the alternates were not awarded. The project budget is reduced from \$1,070,000 to \$592,069 to reflect the current scope. Construction is anticipated to begin in mid-July 2005 and be complete in November 2005. Repair of the bid alternate areas is expected to occur in the 07-09 biennium in a new project.

Funding is from Building Renewal State funds from the 2003-2005 and 2005-2007 bienniums.

Project Name: Raitt & Savery Hall Masonry Abatement Project No: 10441 Action Reported: Contract Award and Budget Decrease of more than 10%

On June 20, 2005 a construction contract was awarded to Extreme Coatings, Inc., (ECI) in the amount of \$906,404 for the Raitt Hall Masonry Abatement project. Six bids were received for the project. The low bid was \$\$906,404 and the high bid was \$1,393,500. ECI recently completed a project at Fresno Dam, in Havre, Montana which renovated the gatehouse listed on the National Registry of Historic Places. This gatehouse project included hazardous coatings removal and asbestos abatement similar to the Raitt Hall project. ECI has also performed coatings removal on all kinds of projects including potable water reservoirs, dam structures, and bridges over water, and public buildings for Gifford Pinchot National Forest. The project budget has been reestablished at \$2,205,000.

The original scope of this project was to abate the existing terra cotta, brick, and stone facades of the 1916 Raitt Hall, 1917-1920 Savery Hall. An existing asbestos containing coating applied to the Raitt and Savery Halls in the 1950's has failed and must be removed to facilitate future renovation and continued building maintenance. The project was originally also to restore the landscape for both buildings.

During design, the University did receive planning funds as part of the 2005-2007 biennium capital budget for Savery Hall. The decision was made to transfer the Savery Hall abatement and landscape work from this project to the Savery Hall building renovation project.

The project scope now includes abatement of the existing facade at Raitt Hall, as well as waterproofing and landscaping at Raitt Hall. The original project budget of \$3,600,000 is now reestablished at \$2,205,000. Funding is available from the 2004 Supplemental Capital Budget.

Construction activity for the ECI construction contract is anticipated to start in July 2005 and be complete in January 2006.

Sand Point Building 25 Core and Shell Project No. 200787 Action Reported: Architect Appointment and Establish Project Budget

On June 23, 2005 a contract for Architectural services was awarded to ARC Architects, for the Sand Point Building 25 Core and Shell/Demolition and Abatement project. ARC Architects has completed multiple projects at Sand Point, Harborview, and the Seattle Campus. The project budget has been established at \$1,621,866.

This project will demolish the interior of Building 25 at Sand Point and upgrades the exterior of the building. Building 25 is a 4 story building (basement included) of approximately 28,050 gross square feet that was constructed in 3 phases between 1927 and 1940. Building 25 is historically significant; certain interior elements including interior hallways on the first floor will be retained. The interior demolition will include removal of existing mechanical, electrical, plumbing, communication systems and non-structural partitions and hazardous materials. The project will also include the demolition and installation of a new roof as well as cleaning and sealing of the masonry and window replacement at the basement and third floor.

When completed, this project will make the core and shell of Building 25 ready for future tenant improvement work. Discussions are underway with academic units to determine the program for the tenant improvement project. A future project will be established to provide the tenant improvements to the building.

This project budget is \$1,621,866 which is to be funded in phases with the initial funding by UW Central Funds for the design phase. Additional funding from UW central funds will be necessary to perform the demolition and exterior improvement work.

Demolition and exterior improvements are anticipated to start in February 2006 and be complete in August 2006 subject to future funding.

Johnson Hall QRC Freezers, Project No. 10559 Action Reported - Contract Award and Budget Increase

On April 14, 2005 a construction contract was awarded to Western Ventures Construction, Inc. in the amount of \$1,020,000 for the Johnson Hall QRC Freezers project. Three bids were received for the project, and the range between the bids was \$1,020,000 to \$1,090,000. Western Ventures is a local general contractor based out of Mountlake Terrace, WA. They have successfully completed numerous projects at the University of Washington. The project budget has been reestablished at \$1,669,000.

This project is for the replacement and renovation of the Johnson Hall QRC Freezers refrigeration systems. This work includes replacing the individual refrigeration compressor with a central plant, replacing the freezers fan-coil (evaporators) within the freezers, providing a rated enclosure around the new refrigeration compressor and providing code required ventilation and refrigeration monitoring. The renovated freezers will be provided with ventilation air from a medical air rated compressor. All electrical service will be upgraded to meet current code requirements. The project is anticipated to be completed by September 9, 2005.

The approved project budget was \$1,391,116. During design, the scope was increased to coordinate tie-in with the main Johnson Hall Renovation project and to accommodate the low velocity air flow requirements of the Department of Earth and Space Sciences. The forecast cost of the project at time of bid was \$1,500,000 to account for these scope changes and material cost escalation. Additional funding was received to allow award of the base contract and bid Alternate No. 2 to relocate an existing wall, taking the project budget to \$1,669,000. Funding is available from Program Renewal funds.

Part II: Report of Actions Taken Under Specific Delegated Authority

Savery Hall Renovation Action Reported: Architect Appointment

In June 2005, authority was delegated to the President to award design contracts for the Clark Hall Renovation project. SRG Partnership, Inc., was recommended as the most qualified firm by the Architectural Commission as described below. It is intended that this project will be brought back to the Board of Regents in November, near the end of the predesign activity, to request approval to establish the budget, request use of an alternative public works contracting method, and request delegated authority to award the construction contract.

Savery Hall, located on the Arts and Sciences Quadrangle of the Seattle campus, was built in two phases. The north structure was built in 1916 and the south addition in 1919. Savery Hall is a major instructional building with 35 percent of its assignable area used as classrooms. There are 25 general assignment classrooms in Savery Hall, with a total of 1,025 seats. Savery Hall houses the College of Arts and Sciences' Departments of Economics, Philosophy, and Sociology, and also provides space for the Center of Social Science Computation and Research (CSSCR), a computer resource center that provides facilities and support of all the social science units. The project is proposed to renew the facility for the current occupants.

Savery Hall has been identified as one of the most critical renovation projects on the Seattle Campus. A comprehensive remodel will be required of most of the building's occupied areas. The project scope is proposed to include correction of seismic deficiencies, as well as a replacement of the electrical, lighting, mechanical, and communications systems. Adding a second elevator, replacement of the existing elevator, modifications to restrooms, ramping and other access improvements will also be included in the renovation to bring this heavily used instructional building into current ADA compliance. The current project scope and budget includes an additional 10,000 assignable square feet, in the current unused attic space.

On April 28, 2005, the Capital Projects Office advertised for firms interested in providing architectural services for the Savery Hall Renovation project. Ten firms submitted qualifications, and on June 2, 2005, a selection committee identified three finalists for interviews. The selection committee included the College of Arts and Sciences, Classroom Support Services, Capital and Space Planning Office, Capital Projects Office and a Board member from the Seattle Chapter of the AIA. On June 20-21, 2005 the Architectural Commission conducted interviews and recommended that SRG Partnership be appointed design architect for this project.

SRG Partnership Inc. is an architectural design firm with offices in Portland, OR and Seattle, WA. The primary team members have worked together extensively on similar complex renovation projects as well as other major public projects. SRG was selected for its in-depth knowledge of academic buildings and their extensive experience in building renovations, especially the Washington State Legislative Building. This firm has a proven track record in the responsive use of State funding, successful pre-design reports, and LEED certified projects.

The preliminary project budget is \$64,127,000. Funding has been approved by the State Legislature for the pre-design phase and has been appropriated for the design phase, which funds are contingent upon receipt of an acceptable pre-design report by the end of 2005. Construction funding will be requested in the 07-09 biennium.

Clark Hall Renovation Action Reported: Architect Appointment

In June 2005, authority was delegated to the President to award design contracts for the Clark Hall Renovation project. Mahlum Architects was recommended as the most qualified firm by the Architectural Commission as described below. It is intended that this project will be brought back to the Board of Regents in November, near the end of the predesign activity, to request approval to establish the budget, request use of an alternative public works contracting method, and request delegated authority to award the construction contract.

Clark Hall, constructed in 1896, is one of the oldest buildings on the Seattle campus. It is on the Washington Heritage Register and originally served as the women's dormitory building and now houses instructional programs for the Navy, Army and Air Force students pursuing a University of Washington degree. The building has 30,568 gross square feet and is primarily used for instructional space and offices, including three general assignment classrooms with a total of 85 stations, one class laboratory, and three computer laboratories.

The project scope will include correction of seismic deficiencies of this wood frame masonry building. The renovation will include upgrading all major building systems, correcting seismic deficiencies, improving accessibility, including adding an elevator, addressing life and safety code conditions, performing asbestos abatement, and providing updated facilities for instructional programs. All electrical, lighting, mechanical, and communications systems will be replaced and the windows and doors will be upgraded to correct code deficiencies and reduce operating costs. An elevator will be added to this

three-story building and access to restrooms throughout the building will be improved to bring the facility into current ADA compliance. The building exterior will be completely renewed to stop the water infiltration currently penetrating the masonry walls. A major renovation will also allow for changes that make more efficient use of the existing space.

On April 28, 2005, the Capital Projects Office advertised for firms interested in providing architectural services for the Clark Hall Renovation project. Eight firms submitted qualifications and on May 31, 2005, a selection committee identified three finalists for interviews. The selection committee included representatives from CASPO, Classroom Support Services, Naval Science, Capital Projects Office and the University's Architectural Advisor. On June 20-21, 2005 the Architectural Commission conducted interviews and recommended that Mahlum Architects be appointed design architect for this project.

Mahlum Architects has worked on 14 projects on the University's campus, including the Suzallo Library Renovation and the William H. Gates School of Law. They have performed 15 pre-design studies for the State of Washington, with 14 having received funding and one currently being reviewed. They are experienced both in renovation and new construction, and have completed a wide variety of projects for higher education clients in the region.

The preliminary project budget is \$18,300,000. Funding has been approved by the State Legislature for the pre-design phase and has been appropriated for the design phase, which funds are contingent upon receipt of an acceptable pre-design report by the end of 2005. Construction funding will be requested in the 07-09 biennium

Playhouse Theater Renovation Action Reported: Architect Appointment

In June 2005, authority was delegated to the President to award design contracts for the Playhouse Theater Renovation project. LMN Architects was recommended as the most

qualified firm by the Architectural Commission as described below. It is intended that this project will be brought back to the Board of Regents in November, near the end of the predesign activity, to request approval to establish the budget, and request delegated authority to award the construction contract.

It is intended that this project will be brought back to the Board of Regents in November, near the end of the pre-design activity, to request approval to establish the budget, and request delegated authority to award the construction contract.

The Playhouse Theater, constructed in 1931 and substantially renovated in 1968, is a one story brick building with a small partial basement totaling 10,137 gross square feet and a seating capacity of just over 200. The Playhouse Theater is assigned to the School of Drama, one of the most renowned drama departments in the United States. The facility is a mainstay of its teaching program and offers students an intensively used venue to stage at least two productions a quarter. Because this heavily used theater is wood framed construction with un-reinforced brick, it poses seismic stability concerns in the event of a major earthquake. Despite the building's intense use, the antiquated infrastructure also makes the building difficult to use for instruction and performances. For example, the heating and ventilation systems are in such poor condition that patrons often complain and students are forced to rehearse with gloves and coats on in winter.

The renovation will include upgrading all major building systems; improving accessibility, seismic resistance, and life and safety code conditions; performing asbestos abatement; and providing updated facilities for theater instruction and performance. Disability access will be improved to bring the building into current ADA compliance.

On April 28, 2005, the Capital Projects Office advertised for firms interested in providing architectural services for the Playhouse Theater Renovation project. Nine firms submitted qualifications and on June 2, 2005, a selection committee identified three finalists for interviews. The selection committee included representatives from the UW School of Drama, Capital Projects Office, CASPO, the College of Arts and Sciences and the University's Architectural Advisor. On June 21, 2005 the Architectural Commission conducted interviews and recommended that LMN Architects be appointed design architect for this project.

LMN Architects, established in Seattle in 1979, has grown to include a professional staff of approximately 100. The firm has designed and renovated more than 30 performance facilities, ranging in size from the \$800,000 Performing Arts Center Renovation @ Western Washington University to the \$90 million rebirth of the Seattle Opera House into Marion Oliver McCaw Hall @ Seattle Center. LMN has completed over 25 projects for the University of Washington, including Programming, Predesign and Design of a wide variety of facilities and building types.

The preliminary project budget is \$7,120,000. Funding has been approved by the State Legislature for the pre-design phase and has been appropriated for the design phase, which

funds are contingent upon receipt of an acceptable pre-design report by the end of 2005. Construction funding will be requested in the 07-09 biennium.

<u>Creation of a New Operating Fee Waiver for Certain Graduate and Professional Students</u>

RECOMMENDED ACTION

It is the recommendation of the administration and the Finance, Audit and Facilities Committee that the Board of Regents establish, under the authority granted by RCW 28B.15.915, an operating fee waiver for certain nonresident graduate and professional students. This operating fee waiver is being proposed to eliminate a potential competitive disadvantage in recruiting top quality graduate and professional students.

Under this operating fee waiver, beginning Autumn Quarter 2005, any graduate or professional student who has lived in the State for one year (except for students whose visa status precludes them from establishing permanent residency) will be eligible for an annual waiver of a portion of operating fees equal to the difference between resident and nonresident tuition. This operating fee waiver will be granted if the student has applied for but failed to qualify for residency under the requirements specified in WAC 250-18-03 but meets the following criteria:

the student signs a statement that they have the intent to establish permanent residency in Washington;

the student has either a Washington State Driver's License or a Washington State Identification Card;

the student is registered to vote, if eligible to vote;

the student has established a bank account under a Washington state address;

if the student owns or drives a vehicle in Washington, it is registered in Washington;

the student maintains any medical/automobile insurance independent of parents; and

the student establishes that he or she is financially independent for the current and prior calendar years.

The annual operating fee waiver will include summer quarter. Students must file a residency application annually to either become reclassified or to establish eligibility for this operating fee waiver.

BACKGROUND

The University of Washington enrolls a substantial number of graduate and professional students from other states. These nonresident students are assessed higher tuition rates unless they are reclassified as a resident student or are granted a nonresident tuition waiver because they hold an eligible teaching or research assistant appointment. The Washington State Legislature has adopted residency requirements (RCW 28B.15.015) and the Higher Education Coordinating Board is responsible for specification of residency criteria through the Washington Administrative Code (WAC Chapter 250-18). The University must follow state law guidelines when determining a student's residency.

WAC Chapter 250-18 was amended in July 2003 to improve the standards for determining residency. The code changes affected undergraduate, graduate, and professional students. The amendments eliminated loopholes that some students had been using to qualify as residents. Ideally, graduate and professional students would have been exempted from the changes for reasons that are discussed below, but the state residency rules apply equally to all student categories.

While the revisions to the residency requirements that were implemented in 2003 made the State's policies for determining residency for undergraduate students comparable to those of other public universities, they imposed a higher standard for graduate and professional students to obtain residency than is common at other public universities with whom we compete for students. At the graduate and professional level, most other public universities allow non-resident graduate and professional students to be reclassified as residents for tuition and fee paying purposes after they have lived in the state for one year as long as they meet requirements similar to those listed on page 1. The UW's ability to compete successfully for top quality graduate and professional students will be enhanced if the UW establishes policies affecting cost of attendance that are consistent with those of institutions with whom we compete.

<u>Current Residency Requirements</u>. To be classified or reclassified as a resident, for tuition and fee purposes, a student must establish a bona fide domicile in the state of Washington "primarily for purposes other than educational" for a period

of one year. To establish a bona fide domicile, a student must satisfy all of the requirements listed on page 1. In addition, by state law, a nonresident student who is enrolled for more than 6 credits a quarter "will be presumed to be in the state of Washington for primarily educational purposes," which makes it much more difficult to establish residency. By agreement among the six public baccalaureate degree granting institutions in the state, the main way to overcome this "6 credit presumption" is by maintaining a 30 hour work week.

Recent Experience. It should be noted that most graduate and professional students applying for residency status under the new rules meet all of the requirements specified. In calendar year 2004, of the 556 graduate students who applied for resident status: 386 students (69%) met all of the requirements of WAC 250-18-030; 70 additional students (13%) likely would have qualified for residency status if they had either been employed full time during the previous year or had been enrolled for less than six credits; and 100 students (18%) failed to meet multiple requirements. In calendar year 2004, of the 106 professional students who applied for residency: 55 students (52%) met all of the requirements; 26 students (25%) likely would have qualified for residency status if they had either been employed full time during the previous year or had been enrolled for less than six credits; and 25 students (24%) failed to meet multiple requirements.

Since the 2003 rules implementation, the University has "grandfathered" the graduate and professional students under the residency requirements that were in effect at the time they entered the university.

Based upon the data from calendar year 2004 discussed above, the Office of Planning and Budgeting estimates that approximately 100 graduate and professional students per year will qualify for this proposed operating fee waiver and that approximately \$1,000,000 per year in operating fees will be waived. Because there is no offsetting State General Fund support provided for operating fee waivers granted under RCW 28B.15.915, this amount represents foregone revenue to the UW.

Recommended Changes. Graduate and professional student recruitment is of paramount importance to the University. As "cost of program" is one important consideration for graduate and professional students choosing which school to attend, we do not want to place the University of Washington at a competitive disadvantage by making the total cost of attending the UW significantly more expensive for graduate and professional students who have lived in the state for

more than a year than it is at competing programs at other public universities. Although exceptions cannot be made in the application of state residency policy, it is possible for the University to grant operating fee waivers to graduate and professional students who do not meet all of the residency requirements but do meet certain specific criteria that establish close connections to the state.

The element of residency requirements that most often prevents graduate and professional students from being classified as residents is the presumption in the requirements that if a student is enrolled for more than six credits a quarter, it is assumed that the student is in the state primarily for educational purposes. Many graduate and professional students cannot meet the 30 hour per week employment factor that is utilized in the residency requirements to overcome this presumption. Under the operating fee waiver established here, any graduate or professional student (except for students whose visa status precludes them from establishing permanent residency) who has lived in the state for at least one year, has applied for resident status and been turned down, and who meets all of the criteria listed on the first page would qualify for a waiver of a portion of operating fees equivalent to the nonresident tuition differential.

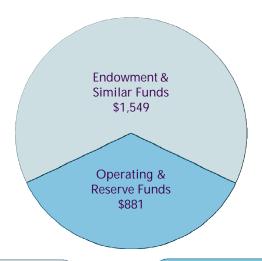






TREASURY ASSETS¹ as of 3/31/05-\$2.4 Billion

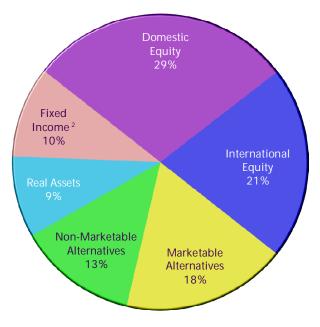






ASSET ALLOCATION As of March 31, 2005

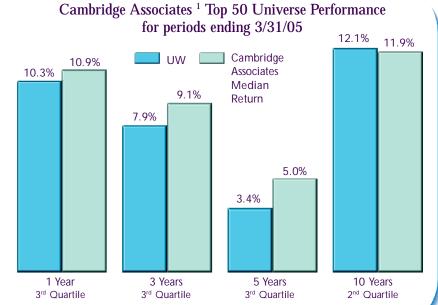

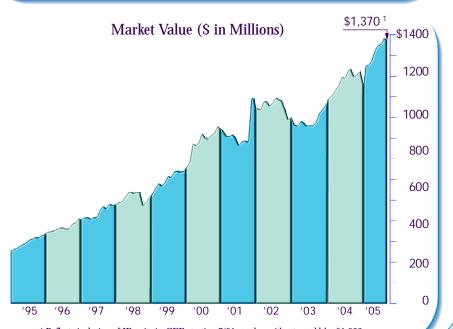

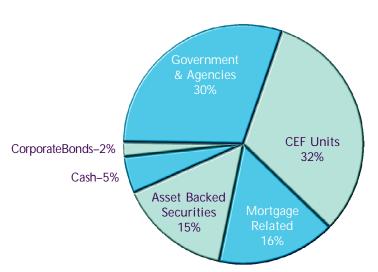

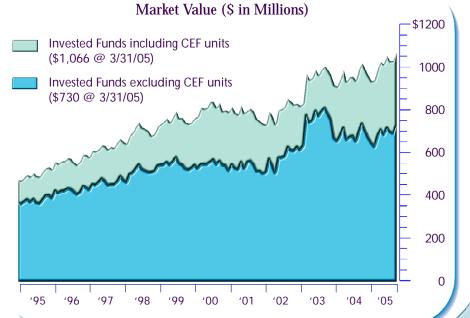
