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# REGISTRATION PERIODS

## STAR REGISTRATION

The University of Washington's touchtone telephone registration system is referred to as STAR-Student Telephone Assisted Registration. STAR registers students in course sections immediately and accommodates subsequent course adds and course drops, immediate alternative section availability if the requesting sections are closed or cancelled, spoken listing of confirmed registration schedule, and open/closed status of course sections. The touchtone telephone registration system is available through the fifth class day of the quarter. Refer to section "How to use STAR."

## REGISTRATION PERIOD I

April 3 - May 31  
via STAR

6 A.M. to 12 midnight, Monday-Friday

STAR is closed May 29 for Memorial Day. STAR will close 6 P.M. May 31 to produce Registration Confirmations and ID Cards.

**ELIGIBILITY.** This period is open to continuing students currently enrolled Spring Quarter 1989, matriculated and nonmatriculated, and to new and returning students applying early enough to be notified of registration eligibility. Students may call STAR to make changes to their schedules after initial registration.

**REGISTRATION CONFIRMATION AND ID CARDS.** Students registering through May 31 will have their Registration Confirmations and ID Cards mailed on June 5.

## REGISTRATION PERIOD II

June 1 - 15  
via STAR  
6 to 12 midnight  
Monday-Friday

STAR will close at 6 P.M., June 15 and remain closed on June 16 to produce Class Lists.

**ELIGIBILITY.** This period is open to continuing students who were enrolled Spring Quarter 1989, and to newly admitted students and returning former students who did not apply early enough to be eligible for Registration Period I, or who missed this period.

**REGISTRATION CONFIRMATION AND ID CARDS.** Registration Confirmations and ID Cards will not be mailed but may be picked up in person in the Registration Office, second floor, Schmitz Hall after 10 on the weekday morning following a call to STAR before 5:30 the prior day. If STAR is called after 5:30, the Registration Confirmation and ID Card will be available in two working days after 10 in the Registration Office.

**CHANGE OF REGISTRATION CONFIRMATIONS.** Registration Change Confirmations will be mailed periodically. Students may also confirm their registration schedules by calling STAR and using the List Schedule Transaction (L #). This listing includes building and classroom locations.

## REGISTRATION PERIOD III

June 17 - 23  
via STAR

12 noon to midnight, Saturday and Sunday

6 A.M. to 12 midnight, Monday-Thursday

6 A.M. to 6 P.M., Friday

or via

Sections, 264 Schmitz, 8 A.M.- 5:30 P.M., Monday-Friday

**ELIGIBILITY.** This period is open to all students for late registration and for changes to registration. A \$25 late registration fee is assessed and billed to students registering during this week, except for faculty/staff tuition exempt and ACCESS students.

Students are encouraged to register and complete changes to registration prior to this period since many course sections will be closed, and completing a schedule will be difficult.

**NEW REGISTRATION CONFIRMATIONS AND ID CARDS.** Registration Confirmations and ID Cards will not be mailed but may be picked up in person in the Registration Office, second floor, Schmitz Hall after 10 on the weekday morning following a call to STAR before 5:30 the prior day. If STAR is called after 5:30, the Registration Confirmation and ID Card will be available in two working days after 10 in the Registration Office.

**CHANGES OF REGISTRATION.** Change confirmations will be mailed on June 26. Students may also confirm their registration schedules by calling STAR and using the List Schedule Transaction (L #). This listing includes building and classroom locations.

## REGISTRATION PERIOD IV

June 26 - August 11  
Sections Office, 264 Schmitz  
8 - 5 Monday-Friday

During this period, a \$20 fee is assessed for changes of registration. Late registrants should refer to the Late Registration section on this page for late fee information. STAR is not in operation during this period, and entry codes are no longer valid. Therefore, you must register or change your registration at the Sections Office.

**ADDING, DROPPING COURSES.** Refer to the Student Action Guide and the Drop Course Grades and Restrictions in Grading Information Related to Registration section.

## SPECIAL-DATE COURSES

In general, the registration, fee payment, and grading requirements of special-date courses will depend on whether the course is identified as an *a*, *b* or *full-quarter* course.

For courses that begin or end on dates other than the standard dates of term *a*, term *b*, or *full quarter*, observe the following:

*Late registration fees.* A \$25 late registration fee will be charged after the first day of the course.

*Dropladd fee.* A \$20 drop/add change fee will be assessed for either dropping or adding a special-date course after the first day of the course.

*Tuition refunds.* Full refund is possible if course is dropped no later than the first day of course instruction. One-half refund is possible if course is dropped during the first 40 percent of course. After 40 percent of the course is completed, no refund.

*Grading.* No grade and no entry on record if course is dropped by first day. Free drops permitted with "W" grade through first 40 percent of course. No drop permitted after 40 percent of course is completed except limited preemptory drops as available to each student. No drops of any kind are permitted on last day of course.

## LATE REGISTRATION

Students whose initial registration occurs after June 15 (July 19 for term *b* courses) will be charged a late registration fee.

## FINAL EXAMINATIONS

There is no separate final examination week during Summer Quarter. Finals are given during the last scheduled class unless all students and their instructor agree on another time.

## FACULTY/STAFF TUITION EXEMPTION

June 12, UW faculty/staff tuition exemption request card due.

REGISTRATION June 14, 6 A.M. to midnight, via STAR

REGISTRATION June 15, 6 A.M. to 6 , via STAR

**APPROVAL REQUIRED.** With the approval of their department administrator, regularly admitted full-time UW faculty and staff members who have been employed six months or more may take up to 6 credits per quarter under the tuition exemption program. According to legislative action, all registrations must be on a space-available basis after other matriculated students have registered.

**ADMISSION STATUS.** Faculty/staff members who enroll must be officially admitted by the Office of Admissions by the regular admission closing date. May 1 is the closing date for Summer Quarter. Faculty/staff members who are former students returning either in the same classification or as nonmatriculated students should apply at the Registration Office, window 7, second floor, Schmitz Hall.

**HOW TO REGISTER.** Mail, or present in person, an appropriately signed UW Faculty/Staff Tuition Exemption Request Card to Sections Office, 264 Schmitz, Mailstop PD-10. This card must be received no later than June 12 so that the tuition exemption status will be recognized when STAR is called this quarter. Complete the STAR Work Sheet before calling in. **FACULTY AND STAFF WILL NOT BE PERMITTED TO CONVERT TO THE TUITION EXEMPTION PROGRAM IF THEY HAVE ALREADY REGISTERED FOR SUMMER QUARTER PRIOR TO JUNE 14, AND THEY WILL BE REQUIRED TO PAY REGULAR TUITION FOR THOSE CREDITS.**

Tuition-exempt faculty/staff are not entitled to other student services such as those available at the Hall Health Center and the Intramural Activities Building. Therefore, UW student cards will not be issued to faculty and staff. Faculty/staff identification cards may be used for library services.

**FEE PAYMENT.** The \$5 registration fee will be billed, but only if registration has successfully occurred. Do not send a \$5 payment until a bill has been received.

**LATE REGISTRATION.** If registration or drop/add is necessary the first week of the quarter, use STAR. The late registration fee will not be assessed during this period for faculty and staff in the tuition exemption program.

## ACCESS PROGRAM FOR OLDER ADULTS

June 14, 8 to 5

Registration Office, second floor, Schmitz Hall

Window 8 or 9

The University of Washington waives tuition for Washington residents sixty years or older who wish to attend classes as auditing students, on a space-available basis. The fee is \$5, whether one or two courses are attended. As auditors, they do not receive credit and are not expected to do laboratory work or to take examinations. A transcript is not maintained. Students who attend the University under the Access program are limited to two courses per quarter.

Registration may be made in person or by mail. For additional information about the program in general, telephone UW Extension, 543-2300, between 8 and 5, weekdays.

## ACADEMIC ADVISING

Students are strongly encouraged to see an academic adviser to discuss their educational objectives, to assess progress toward completion of requirements, and to learn procedures involved in registering at the University. It is wise for students to make appointments with advisers and to have ideas of courses they would like to take by reviewing the *General Catalog* and the quarterly *Time Schedule* before the advising session. If students fail to maintain contact with their advisers and problems develop with degree programs, these problems are the students' responsibilities. The consequence may be additional time to complete degree programs.

# HOW TO USE STAR

**1. TOUCHTONE TELEPHONE.** Use only a touchtone telephone to make entries on STAR. Touchtone phones make a different tone after each key is pressed. Telephones that make no tone or only a monotone will not work on the registration system. Your touchtone phone acts as a computer keyboard, enabling you to enter your course requests just as if you were sitting at a computer terminal. Within minutes, you will know your confirmed schedule.

**2. CALLING STAR.** STAR is available, during published registration dates and times. STAR is closed on holidays and may close earlier than 12 midnight on a few days to produce registration confirmations, ID cards, and instructors' class list. If STAR does not answer your call, it is not in operation. If the phone line is busy, all lines are being used. Call back later. You may call STAR during, or after, your initial registration date to add, drop, check section status, etc.

**3. VOICE RESPONSE.** A voice response will guide you after each transaction. If you do not understand a response or instruction and would like it repeated, press the star key (\*) first, and then the number sign key (#).

**4. IF YOU MAKE A MISTAKE.** If you make a mistake before finishing an entry, press the star key and the number sign key (\*#), and your entry will be discarded.

**5. TO SPEED UP YOUR REGISTRATION.** To expedite your registration, you may enter data during the voice response. Be cautious about doing this, since you may miss some important information such as when and where to obtain your Registration Confirmation and ID Card.

**6. DISCONNECT ACTION.** Time limits are built into the system, so if you are holding on the STAR line for an extended period of time, you will be disconnected. Error limits are also a part of the STAR system, so if you do not enter the correct information after the second try, STAR will disconnect. You may immediately call back to STAR.

**7. TRANSACTIONS.** The transactions you enter on your touchtone telephone communicate to the computer what action to take (such as add a course, drop a course, check a section status, etc.) and what data you want considered. The transaction code legend follows:

- A = Add a course
- D = Drop a course
- L = Hear a spoken listing of your assigned courses
- S = Check the open or closed status of a course
- T = Terminate your call and get information on how to obtain your Registration Confirmation and ID card
- \* = Star key; used to separate data
- # = Number sign key; used to send transactions that you enter

**8. ENTRY CODES.** Entry codes are five digit random numbers issued to you by academic departments as authorization to enroll in restricted course sections. Academic departments have the ability to establish varying levels of enrollment control for course sections in each registration period, or they can maintain the same level of control throughout.

Courses requiring entry codes are designated with the symbol > to the left of the schedule line number (SLN) in the *TIME SCHEDULE*. Please note that departments reserve the right to require entry codes whether the course is so designated in the *TIME SCHEDULE* or not. Usually information on where to obtain entry codes is found in the body of the *TIME SCHEDULE*, either as a comment before the course listing or just after the title of the course. Contact the department offering the course if STAR advises you an entry code is required and the location for obtaining one is not identified in the *TIME SCHEDULE*.

Once you have used an entry code, the computer removes it from the list of viable codes and will not accept it again. If you drop a section that required an entry code to add, then you must obtain another entry code from the department if you wish to readd the section.

When you use an entry code to register, it becomes a part of your registration record, and is visible with your name on computer terminal

screens. Entry codes are valid only through the fifth day of the quarter. Beginning the sixth day, you must obtain departmental authorization signatures to add courses using standard Add/Drop cards. These cards must be submitted in person at the Sections Office, 264 Schmitz Hall, and a \$20 change fee will be assessed.

**9. LECTURE/LAB/QUIZ/CONFERENCE.** STAR will not allow you to enroll in a lab, quiz, or conference section without registering in the lecture section first. Also, you must register for any quiz, lab, or conference associated with a lecture, or your registration in the lecture will be cancelled. This cancellation is not immediate, so you may mistakenly assume you are registered in a class from which you will later be removed. You will not be allowed to drop a lecture section without first dropping the associated lab/quiz/conference sections.

**10. ALTERNATE SELECTIONS.** If the section requested is closed you will be informed by STAR of open section alternates (including new sections added after the publication of the quarterly *TIME SCHEDULE*). You can then immediately select an alternate section to be added to your schedule. Have a pencil ready and be prepared to write down schedule line numbers (SLN) and meeting times of alternate sections.

**11. TIME CONFLICT.** You may not register on STAR for two courses that meet at the same time or for courses with overlapping meeting times. If you want the second course instead of the one you are registered for, you must drop the first one before adding the second course on STAR. If you want two time-conflicting courses, you must add the second course, in person, at Sections in 264 Schmitz during any registration period, or at one of the satellites during Registration Period III. Time conflicts of more than one hour require instructors' signatures for both courses involved.

**12. REGISTRATION HOLDS.** If you have a hold on your registration, you will not be permitted to complete your registration until the hold has been released by the initiating office. If you attempt to register on STAR before your hold has been released, the voice response will indicate which office has placed the hold, and where to go to get it released.

**13. ELECTING S/NS GRADING OPTION.** You may register for a course on STAR, but you must go in person to Sections, 264 Schmitz, to elect the Satisfactory/Not Satisfactory grading option.

**14. AUDIT.** Audit registrations will not be processed by STAR, but must be completed in person at Sections, 264 Schmitz Hall.

**15. CREDIT LIMITATIONS.** Undergraduates will be limited to 19 credits during Registration Periods I and II to allow all students a chance to develop a basic schedule. Additional credits may be added during Registration Period III. Thirty credits is the limit per quarter.

**16. VARIABLE CREDITS.** Some courses are offered for a variable number of credits. See the department to obtain the appropriate number of credits for a variable credit course and be prepared to enter the number of credits when requested to do so by the voice response on STAR. To change variable credits, go to Sections, 264 Schmitz.

**17. SECTION II ON STAR WORKSHEET.** Since Section II requires selection decisions only during your first telephone call this quarter, you may proceed directly from Section I to Section III through Section VIII in a random manner when making subsequent calls.

STAR will not accommodate changes of your initial decisions in SECTION II. You must go in person to the Sections Office, 264 Schmitz Hall to modify selections. Faculty/staff using tuition exemption program will not be asked to make decisions for Section II.

**18. QUESTIONS.** If you have questions regarding registration, please call Sections, (206) 543-5875, Monday through Friday, from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

**FOLLOW THESE STEPS BEFORE CALLING STAR**

- STEP 1.** Read the Registration Periods, How To Use STAR, and the STAR Work Sheet sections of this *Time Schedule* carefully.
- STEP 2.** Academic advising is highly recommended, and it is suggested that you make an appointment with your adviser before registering. Use the Trial Schedule Form provided below to draft your schedule.
- STEP 3.** Obtain entry codes from departments for courses requiring entry codes.
- STEP 4.** Organize your registration materials (*Time Schedule, STAR Work Sheet*). Use the *Summer 1989 TIME SCHEDULE* to obtain the schedule line number (SLN) for each course section. SLN's change every quarter. Develop your program on the Trial Schedule Form. Prepare an alternate course section list because some sections may be full. Complete the STAR Work Sheet. By completing the work sheet before calling STAR, you will have all the information you need at your fingertips, and will reduce the chances of being disconnected.
- STEP 5.** Take care of all University financial obligations before calling STAR, since STAR will not permit you to register if there is a "hold" on your registration.
- STEP 6.** Call STAR from a touchtone telephone and begin with Section I on the STAR Work Sheet. You will be asked to provide information in Section II during your first telephone call to STAR. Always exit STAR using the "T" transaction following by the number sign key (#) so that you can find out how to obtain your Registration Confirmation and ID Card.
- STEP 7.** Remember once you have initially registered, you can call STAR as often as you want to check the status of sections, have your confirmed schedule listed, or add/drop courses.

# ADDITIONAL REGISTRATION INFORMATION AND NOTICES

**1. ADDRESS CHANGE TELEPHONE SERVICE - CALL 543-3868.** Students are responsible for notifying the Registrar's Office when their address changes. An Address Change Telephone Answering Service is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week for changes of local/permanent addresses and telephone numbers, restricting release of directory information, and where to mail registration confirmations, ID cards, tuition billing statements, and final grades. Students should always leave a forwarding address with the U. S. Postal Service whenever they move. You may also change your address in person at the Registration Office, window 5, second floor, Schmitz Hall.

If you have applied for financial aid, you must also report your address change to the Office of Financial Aid.

**2. CLASS ATTENDANCE GUIDELINES.** To provide enrollment space for others, students who do not attend regularly scheduled class meetings during the first week of the quarter are subject to being dropped at the discretion of the teaching departments. Affected courses will be identified in the *TIME SCHEDULE* and posted in departmental offices.

Students must not assume that departments will automatically initiate a drop for nonclass attendance. Students who register for courses they do not attend are themselves responsible for officially dropping the courses through the Registrar's Office. The consequence of not officially dropping courses is a 0.0 grade.

Students should contact the instructor or teaching department if they plan to be absent any day during the first week of the quarter.

No person, other than a faculty member attending informally with the approval of the instructor, may attend a University course in which that person has not been officially registered through the Registrar's Office. An instructor may allow a student to attend his or her class only if the student's name appears on the official class list from the Registrar's Office.

**3. REGISTRATION TAMPERING.** A student who tampers or attempts to tamper with the registration records of another student including but not limited to dropping courses and adding courses may be subject to disciplinary sanctions as defined in the Student Conduct Code (WAC 47B-120).

**4. FULL-TIME STUDENT REQUIREMENT.** To be considered a full-time student, an undergraduate must register for 12 credits and a graduate student must register for 9 credits. However, it is important to note that various and differing criteria and standards for full-time enrollment exist for participatory eligibility, e.g., Veterans Administration, athletic eligibility, Bureau of Indian Affairs, Vocational Rehabilitation, and various forms of financial aid. Information on full-time requirements of the Veterans Administration and the Immigration and Naturalization Service may be obtained at 460 Schmitz. Consult the Financial Aid Office for its requirement on satisfactory student progress.

**5. OVERLOAD GUIDELINES.** For reasons of public safety and instructional quality, course enrollment in each section will be limited to not more than the approved classroom capacity. The Registrar's Office monitors course enrollments for full quarter quarter courses according to the following guidelines:

a. Through the fifth class day, students may add a section without permission unless the class is full or requires permission; then an entry code is required. The Registrar's Office will accept course overloads up to 115% of classroom capacity when the student presents an entry code from either the instructor or authorized person in the department.

b. From the second through the fifth week, overload authorization signatures will be accepted up to 105% of classroom capacity.

c. Beginning the sixth week, no course registration will be accepted without co-signatures by both the instructor and the department chairperson. Registration will not be permitted if enrollment has reached 100% of classroom capacity.

**6. COMPLETE WITHDRAWAL FROM THE UNIVERSITY.** (Dropping all courses for the quarter). It is the student's responsibility to withdraw completely if he or she is unable to

attend for the quarter. Students must write the Withdrawal Office, 264 Schmitz Hall, Mailstop PD-10, University of Washington, Seattle, Washington, 98195. Complete withdrawal for the quarter is not available via STAR.

Tuition owed will be based upon the date the complete withdrawal is received in the Withdrawal Office. No withdrawals are accepted after the last day of instruction for the quarter.

Courses dropped as part of a complete withdrawal from the University during the first two weeks of a quarter are not recorded on the student's UW transcript; however, the date of the complete withdrawal is recorded.

The forfeiture schedule for completely withdrawing from the University is as follows:

No withdrawals will be accepted after July 12 for *term a* courses or after August 11 for *term b* and *full-quarter* courses. The fee schedule below will be followed:

**Full-Quarter or term a-only courses.**

- Students withdrawing by the fifth day of the quarter or term (June 23) do not pay tuition or fees.
- Students withdrawing on the sixth through the tenth class day of the quarter or term (June 26 - June 30) are obligated for one-half of their tuition and fees.
- Students withdrawing after the tenth class day of the quarter or term (June 30) are obligated for full tuition and fees.
- Students whose registrations are canceled for nonpayment of fees will continue to owe the University one-half their tuition and fees.
- International students who are registered for an English as a Second Language course must make a separate request for a refund for that course by contacting the ESL Office in 102 Lewis Hall at the same time they withdraw from the University.

**Term b-only courses**

- Students withdrawing on or after June 26 and before the sixth class day of the term (July 27) are eligible for a full refund of tuition and fees.
- Students withdrawing on the sixth through the tenth class day of the term (July 27 - August 2) are obligated for one-half of their tuition and fees.
- Students withdrawing after the tenth class day of the term (August 2) receive no refund of tuition and fees.
- Term b-only* registrants who do not pay their tuition and fees by July 7 will have their registration automatically canceled. However, because this date occurs during the official withdrawal period for *term b-only* registration, these students are not obligated for one-half their tuition and fees.

Students who were unable to turn in their withdrawal on time because of extenuating circumstances may petition the penalty. Petition forms are available in the Student Accounts and Scholarships Office, 129 Schmitz.

If you have been accepted for Summer-Autumn, withdrawal from Summer Quarter on or after June 19 does not affect your Autumn Quarter status. Withdrawal must, however, be official to guarantee Autumn Quarter space. Withdrawal from Summer Quarter prior to June 19 invalidates summer registration, and a new application for Autumn Quarter is required.

Courses dropped as part of a University withdrawal completed by June 30 for *full-quarter* registration and by June 23 and July 26 for *term a* and *term b* registration, respectively, receive no grade and no entry. Withdrawal after these dates results in the courses being assigned a grade of "W."

Students are required to turn in their student ID cards when they withdraw from the University and are not eligible to continue using University services or facilities after their withdrawal.

**7. UNDERGRADUATE SATISFACTORY PROGRESS.** Students admitted to the University to pursue baccalaureate degrees are expected to make satisfactory progress toward the attainment of that degree, and are expected to enter a major and graduate after completion of a reasonable number of credits. Refer to the *GENERAL CATALOG* for additional information.

**8. STUDENT DIRECTORY INFORMATION.** The University will routinely release student directory information, unless requested otherwise by the student. Directory information is defined as student's name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, major field of studies, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and the most recent previous educational institution attended by the student.

**9. DISCLOSURE of STUDENT RECORDS.** As a general rule the University will not release a student's education records to a third party without written consent of the student. The complete University policy on student education records and the location of such records may be found in the Washington Administrative Code under WAC 478-140. Manuals containing the Code are available at Reference Stations on campus, and at the Visitor's Information Center, 4014 University Way NE. The policy covers such items as accessibility, review and expunging of inaccurate records, and costs to be charged for copies of student records.

**10. FOLLOWING RULES AND REGULATIONS.** It is the University's expectation that a student will follow University rules and regulations as they are stated in the *GENERAL CATALOG*. In instances where no appeal procedure is spelled out and the student believes that a special set of circumstances makes appeal reasonable, he or she may appeal the application of specific rules or regulations to the office of the dean of the school or college in which he or she is enrolled in the case of an academic matter, or to the Office of Student Affairs in the case of a nonacademic matter. These offices will either render a decision on the appeal or refer the student to the proper office for a decision.

**11. EQUAL OPPORTUNITY.** The University of Washington provides equal opportunity in education without regard to race, color, creed, religion, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, age, marital status, disability, or status as a disabled veteran or Vietnam era veteran in accordance with University of Washington policy and applicable federal and state statutes and regulations.

**12. SEXUAL HARASSMENT GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE.** Students, as well as members of the faculty and staff, who wish to file a complaint regarding sexual harassment may contact either of the two offices listed below:

Personnel in these offices will be available to discuss and provide assistance in resolving the complaint.

**13. INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS** must subscribe to the student insurance plan unless they are covered by another plan. Refer to the *STUDENT INSURANCE* section for more details.

**14. DISABLED STUDENTS.** Various support services, including priority registration, are available to students with disabilities. Contact the Coordinator for Disabled Student Services (DSS), 482 Schmitz, 543-8924, 543-8925 TDD, for information on equipment, services, accessibility, and accommodations to meet individual needs.

Students with disabilities who require special accommodations for science labs, internships, etc., should contact the DSS Coordinator and the academic adviser of that department immediately to work out appropriate services.

The STAR Work Sheet and Instructions are available from DSS in alternate media, including tape recording, large print and braille. Students with disabilities which would limit their ability to use STAR may register through DSS or at the Sections Office, 264 Schmitz Hall.

**15. THE ASSOCIATED STUDENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON (ASUW).** The Associated Students of the University of Washington is a voluntary association of students designated by the University Regents to carry out a variety of student activities. In order to vote in ASUW elections or hold ASUW office students must be members. Student's membership choice will not affect tuition payment in any way. Information about the ASUW can be obtained from the ASUW Office in, Room 204L Student Union Building.

### PEREMPTORY DROP (UNDERGRADUATES).

While completing the first 44 credits at the University, a student has three preemptory drops permitted after the fourth week. Any of these three drops not used at the time 45 credits are earned are forfeited. After 45 credits have been completed at the University, the student earns one late drop for each 45 credits earned. These may be accumulated and used as necessary.

**HARDSHIP WITHDRAWAL.** Hardship withdrawals are for dropping single courses only. See section on Complete Withdrawal from the University for procedure to follow for dropping all courses for the quarter; no petition is required to drop all courses.

Students may petition the Registrar for a hardship withdrawal if: (1) the student is unable to complete the course in question because of a severe mental or physical disability, or (2) unusual or extenuating circumstances beyond the student's control prevented the student from dropping the course by the drop deadline. See the *General Catalog* for complete information.

### SATISFACTORY/NOT SATISFACTORY

Students may elect to take certain courses on a Satisfactory/Not Satisfactory (S/NS) basis. Advisers should be consulted, and in no case are undergraduate students allowed to register for more than one course or 6 credits on a Satisfactory/Not Satisfactory basis in a given quarter.

Students may register for the course on STAR, but they must go in person to Sections in 264 Schmitz Hall to elect the S/NS grade option. STAR will not accommodate the S/NS grade option.

For undergraduates, a course in which an "S" is earned may not be used to satisfy any department, college, or University requirement, except that the credits may be applied to the minimum of 180 credits required for graduation. Each instructor will report conventional grades to the Registrar, who will convert satisfactory grades (2.0 or greater) to "S," and unsatisfactory grades (less than 2.0) to "NS" for the student's transcript. No more than 25 S/NS credits will apply to an undergraduate degree. *S/NS must be elected during initial registration or added or dropped during the first five days of the quarter.*

Graduate students earning grades of 2.7 or above receive a grade of S (Satisfactory), while 2.6 or below are recorded as NS (Not Satisfactory). With the approval of his or her graduate program adviser or Supervisory Committee Chairperson, a graduate student may elect to take any course for which he or she is eligible outside of his or her major academic unit on an S/NS basis.

In cases of withdrawal, the W is recorded. Neither S nor NS are included in the grade-point average. N, I, and X are recorded until the instructor reports the final grade, or in cases of incompletes received by undergraduates, until the I is converted by the Registrar.

### CREDIT/NO CREDIT

Some courses are offered on a credit/no credit (CR/NC) basis. It is not possible to register S/NS to take these courses, because the only grades assigned by the instructor are CR (Credit) or NC (No Credit). Neither CR nor NC is included in the grade-point average. In cases of withdrawal a W is recorded. N, I, and X are recorded until the instructor reports the final grade, or in cases of Incompletes received by undergraduates, until the I is converted by the Registrar.

### AUDITORS

STAR is not available for audit registration which must be completed in person at Sections, 264 Schmitz Hall. Registration is available during any of the registration periods. Attendance in courses as an auditor is by consent of the instructor involved and is conditioned on the space available. Permission to audit is ordinarily granted for lecture classes only. An auditor may not participate in class discussion or laboratory work, and his or her registration may be canceled at the discretion of the instructor. No entry is made on the permanent record for courses audited. To receive credit for an audited course, the student must register for the class for credit in a subsequent quarter.

Auditors, except ACCESS program students, pay standard tuition and fees and must be regularly admitted and registered in the course. Although credits for audited courses will not be listed on the schedule of classes, they will be included in the billing on the fee statement. Such credits count in the calculation of fees.

### INCOMPLETE GRADE

Incomplete grades may only be awarded if the student is doing satisfactory work up until the last two weeks of the quarter. Undergraduate students must not reregister for courses in which they have received an Incomplete. A grade earned in a repeat course will not be recorded as an incomplete conversion grade. See the *General Catalog* on Incomplete conversion deadlines.

### Special Course and Laboratory Fees

The amounts charged for tuition and fees normally cover University charges for course registration. Some courses, however, have extraordinary expenses associated with them and in such cases the University may charge additional fees in amounts approximating the added instructional or laboratory costs.

## TUITION FORFEITURES OR REFUNDS

Students will be billed for the number of credits they are registered for, including audit hours, at the beginning of the quarter. Courses added after this date may result in additional fees. Only partial fee reductions will be made for *full-quarter* and *term a* courses dropped after June 23. *Term b* courses dropped by July 26 will result in full refund of fee differential.

For each category of courses (*full-quarter*, *term a* or *term b*), there is a period during which students owe one-half the fees associated with dropped courses.

<i>term b</i>	July 27 - August 2

After these final dates, there is no reduction in the fees owed, due to drops or withdrawal.

The effective drop date is the date the drop is processed on STAR or in Sections, 264 Schmitz.

## TUITION PAYMENT GUIDELINES

1. It is the student's responsibility to see that tuition is paid in full by the tuition due date (third Friday of each quarter). Bills are sent at the beginning of each quarter to facilitate payment. However, failure to receive a tuition bill does not nullify the student's responsibility for payment by the due date.

2. Students should indicate selection of their permanent or local address on STAR for fee statement mailing. If they have not received a fee statement by the end of the second week of the quarter, contact the Student Accounts and Scholarships Office for the amount of tuition due.

3. Students may pay fees in person in the Student Accounts and Scholarships Office or mail them to UW, Student Accounts and Scholarships Office, 129 Schmitz, PE-10, Seattle, WA 98195, before the tuition due date. Fees must be paid by Friday of the third week of the quarter. Payments postmarked on or before the due date are accepted without a late fee. Metered mail received after the due date is subject to penalties as described in #4 below.

4. If students fail to pay by the deadline, they may continue to pay their tuition the week following the due date, plus a late fee as follows:

If payment has not been received in the Student Accounts and Scholarships Office by this time, their registrations will be cancelled. Students permitted to reregister after cancellation for nonpayment will be charged a \$75 fee, in addition to their tuition.

5. If students reregister, they must reregister for all classes on their schedule at the time of registration cancellation. (Fees will include appropriate charges for classes dropped during the forfeiture period.) No reregistration will be possible after the last day of instruction. *Please note: Even if registration is cancelled, a student will continue to owe one-half of their tuition.*

6. Credit cards and credit card checks are not accepted.

7. Tuition and fees not paid by the end of the academic quarter will be subject to an interest charge of 1% per month, or fraction of a month, (12% A.P.R.), beginning with the month following the end of the quarter.

## APPLICATION OF PAYMENTS TO A STUDENT'S ACCOUNT

As a rule, payments received for a student's account are applied to charges in order of their due dates. For charges with the same due date, payments are applied first to tuition and related University fees and then to other charges on the account. A payment may be applied to a specific charge by contacting the Student Accounts Office at 129 Schmitz Hall. Financial aid from Federal Title IV programs is applied only to required tuition and fees and to loan and aid repayment obligations. The University may not apply such aid to pay insurance and some other optional charges.

## STUDENT INSURANCE

The University offers a voluntary accident and sickness insurance plan to supplement the services available at the Hall Health Center. UW students, except those enrolled in programs administered by UW Extension and UW employees attending classes under the employee tuition exemption program, who remain registered through at least the first six days of instruction in the quarter are eligible to enroll in the plan.

Students may sign up for the plan when they register for classes. If students are registered for classes by their academic departments, and no plan is indicated, they will be enrolled in the student only quarterly plan. The insurance premium will be included on the quarterly tuition statements and must be paid by the quarterly tuition-due date. In most cases Financial Aid will not pay insurance directly so students must make sure the premium is paid on time. There is no late payment period for the insurance premium.

If students are billed for student insurance and wish to add, cancel, or change coverage, they complete the appropriate section on the remittance advice copy of the billing statement and pay the revised amount, or they may do so in person in the Student Accounts and Scholarships Office by the tuition-due date.

International students must subscribe to the student insurance plan unless they are covered by another plan. Proof of other coverage must be submitted to the International Services Office and a waiver obtained each Autumn Quarter (or upon initial admission if other than Autumn Quarter) because waivers are valid only through Summer Quarter each year. Students holding insurance policies that expire during the academic year are responsible for obtaining new waivers, as necessary.

Brochures describing the plan in more detail are available at the Hall Health Center, the HUB, and the 2nd floor Information Window in Schmitz Hall. Plan benefits may change each academic year, so students are encouraged to review the brochure carefully.

The University also sponsors a field-trip accident insurance plan. Applications may be requested from the Risk Management Office, 270 Administration Building, or by calling 543-1083.

#### **WASHINGTON STUDENT LOBBY (WSL)**

The Washington Student Lobby (WSL) is a voluntary, independent organization of university students whose purpose is to influence the Washington State Legislature and others on higher education matters of special interest to students. Students may choose to support the WSL by contributing \$1.00 each quarter. Support for the WSL may be indicated during registration and the voluntary contribution will be included on the tuition billing statement for payment with tuition.

#### **WASHINGTON PUBLIC INTEREST RESEARCH GROUP (WASHPIRG)**

The Washington Public Interest Research Group (WashPIRG) is a student-directed, non-profit and non-partisan research organization. Students may choose to support WashPIRG by contributing \$2.00 each quarter. Support for WashPIRG may be indicated during registration and the voluntary contribution will be included on the tuition billing statement for payment with tuition.



## "W" COURSES OFFERED SUMMER QUARTER 1989

Students who plan to take majors in the College of Arts and Sciences and who started college Autumn Quarter 1983, or later, must complete 10 credits of courses designated "W". Students graduating in colleges/schools other than Arts and Sciences may also be required to complete "W" courses. "W" courses are not English composition courses but, rather, are courses in which a substantial amount of writing is required. Almost any department can offer "W" courses. # MUSICAL MECCAS

## College radio leads the way in launching new talent

If grades were assigned for alternative music, Austin and Athens would surely earn A's.

Yet these two college towns—homes of the Universities of Texas and Georgia, respectively—share a national reputation as breeding grounds. From the bouffanted B-52s to REM to Charlie Sexton and Will and the Kill, the two continually feed the alternative music scene.

Athens, a proverbial music mecca to some, has long been known for the tunes ringing from its hallowed halls. Two of its earliest fledglings, the

B-52s and a recently regrouped Pylon, are still making waves, while REM, perhaps the biggest of all Athens bands, has moved into the mainstream after years playing the college town.

The music scene's an ocean of activity with bands constantly crashing, regrouping and resurfacing. With such goings-on, it's no surprise the University of Georgia's radio station, WUOG, devotes much of its programming to progressive music.

"It's really an interesting social phenomenon," said Manfred Jones, graduate adviser to the station, speaking of the Athens music scene. "Chances are you'll be able to find any type of music you want here, if you know where to look...but it's sometimes hard to classify."

Jones described Athens' latest bands. Some have recording contracts and national reputations; others are a bit more obscure and, as of now, known only to the Athens crowd. "As far as very fast, pounding music, we've got Mercyland, the Bar-b-q Killers, Porn Orchard and Jack-o-Nuts," he said.

"As far as a Grateful Dead-ish type sound, the big ones around town are Wide-spread

Panic and Gypsy Cab Company."

Rockabilly artists include the Flat Duo Jets and the Flying Cheetahs, while Billy James, the Kilkenny Cats and Dreams So Real, the latest Athens band to land a major recording contract, are upholding REM's jingle-jangle tradition. Love Tractor and 10,000 Maniacs are still cranking out the tunes.

Jones, who's lived in Athens since 1984, had some definite opinions on Athens and its music. "It's so funny sometimes when people talk of Athens as a music scene," he said. "Actually there's three clubs in town—the Uptown Lounge, the 40-Watt Club and the Rockfish Palace—that feature new bands."

"People think of Athens as a place where there's music on every corner and people walk around wearing black all the time. What they don't realize is that out of 26,000 students, about 1,500 support the clubs."

To meet the needs of such students, WUOG broadcasts all sorts of music including reggae, rap, blues, jazz, dance mixes and a light sprinkling of folk, Jones added, however, that the local music scene sometimes draws people to Athens.

"Some people come here thinking

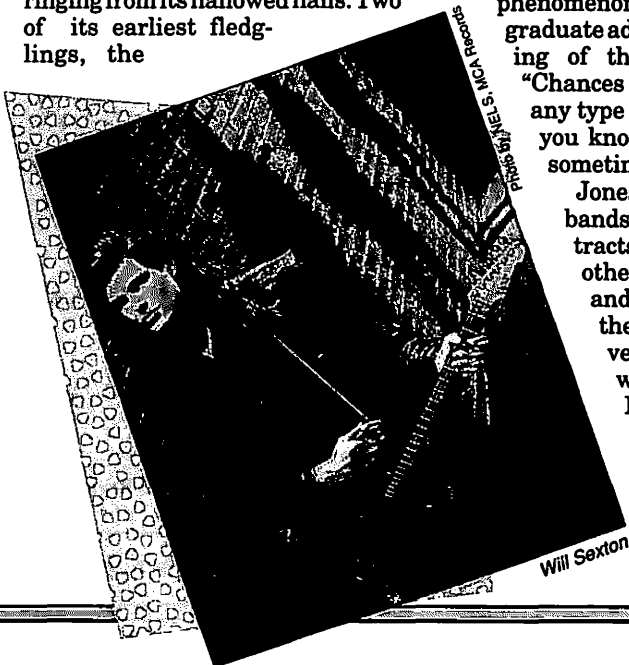

it's a great music scene and they'll form a band and live out some musical fantasy," he said. "There's not anything on every street corner, but at the same time, people who say it's dead don't know where to look."

Austin, Texas, over 700 miles west of Athens, has also developed its own alternative music scene within the past decade. Originally a hotbed for country music (hence the public television show, "Austin City Limits"), Austin has been a launching pad for several alternative artists of late. Charlie Sexton, an alternative artist who now moves in more mainstream circles, was one of the first Austin exports, while his 17-year-old brother Will is fronting one of the Texas capital's newest bands, Will and the Kill.

Other Austin bands remain obscure, except to the seasoned alternative music fan, but their colorful names are enough to attract attention. These new bands include Jane's Addiction, Bad Seeds, Glass Eye, Texas Instruments, Bad Mutha Goose, Skeleton Key, Two Nice Girls, Salem Tree, The Reivers, The Killer Bees, True Believers, The Mindsplinters, Ed Hall and Child Bearing Hips.

Perhaps the most intriguing of the new artists is Daniel Johnston. "He's an insane genius," said Thaddeus Evert, a disc jockey for the

University of Texas' KTSB. "He recorded a song called, 'Hi, How Are You?' It's purely sincere and sounds like a 17-year-old did it in his basement." Johnston's single is available on Homestead Records.

Another popular area band is Poi Dog Pondering. "They're the hottest property in Austin right now," said Evert. The band divides its time between Austin and Honolulu and records on Austin-based Rabbit Cat Records.

The Austin music scene is encouraged by the 50,000 students at the University of Texas. "The Austin music scene depends heavily on the college," said Evert. "It's not in the college, but of the college. It's a feeding ground for it."

Like Athens' WUOG, KTSB plays a bit of everything, About 80 percent of the time, the station plays what's loosely called "college music" tracks by new and local artists. The other 20 percent is devoted to specialty shows on reggae, blues, jazz, heavy metal and psychedelic music.

"We try to play at least two local artists an hour," said Michael McCalpin, who produces a news parody

for the station. KTSB, which is the soundtrack for the Community Bulletin Board on television and broadcasts via Austin's city cable system, is currently petitioning the Federal Communications Commission for a spot as a broadcast FM station.

Although Athens and Austin are the breeding grounds for new music, the appeal of alternative artists spreads far beyond the borders of the Peach and Lone Star states. College stations across the country have converted to an all or semi-alternative format and are having an impact on national record charts.

Bill Cerrito, chart manager for *Billboard* magazine's Modern Rock Chart, surveys 29 alternative stations across the country for his weekly tally. The 29 include college stations in Las Vegas, San Francisco, Atlanta, Nashville, New Orleans, Melbourne, Fla., Princeton, N.J., Albany, N.Y. and Morgantown, W. Va.

Peter Standish, alternative music editor of San Francisco's *Gavin Report*, surveys stations to compile *Rolling Stone's* College Album Chart and rankings for MTV. "I try to survey the most progressive commercial and influential college stations in the country," he said.

New York University's WNYU has called itself a progressive station since the '70s. "In the late '70s we started the 'New Afternoon Show,' which was into punk and new wave," said Hugh Foley, general manager of the station. Foley said his station strays away from alternative bands once they make it big. "Bands like REM have gone to bigger and better things. They've done what they're going to do," he said. "You can hear them anywhere."

The station's top Austin bands include Pocket Fishermen and Green on Red, while the Bar-b-q Killers, Pylon and the Kilkenny Cats are Athens favorites.

Smaller college stations are also getting into progressive programming. KASF, an FM station at Adams

State College in Alamosa, Colo., broadcasts alternative music. According to music director Reed Lewis, KASF provides the only progressive programming in the town of 8,000. "We're four hours south of Denver and four hours north of Albuquerque," he said. "There's no competition. Sometimes we can pick stations from Albuquerque, but they're all top 40." KASF, which originated 20 years ago, serves Adams State's 2,500 students and the surrounding areas.

But other stations such as Vanderbilt University's WRVU, have switched entirely to an alternative format: The 14,500 watt FM station can be heard all over Nashville, according to its general manager, Henrik Meng. The station plays rock from 6 a.m. to midnight and jazz from midnight to 6 a.m. Specialty shows are broadcast during the weekend.

Meng says the station, one of the nine college stations reporting to *Billboard* magazine, has a special mission. "Everyone plays crap like Whitney Houston and Top 40 stuff. Those stations are a dime a dozen," he said. "We're the only alternative station in Nashville. We offer something no one else does. It's a service to the community."

Meng added his station doesn't cater to the whims of Vanderbilt. "We're a Vanderbilt University station, but in reality we serve the community more than Vanderbilt students. The majority of the students wouldn't listen to what we play." Being in the country music capital, WRVU offers an even greater alternative to Nashville's countless pickin' and grinnin' selections. "These country stations are everywhere," Meng said. "They cram them all at the right end of the dial and we're on the left. I think it's symbolic."

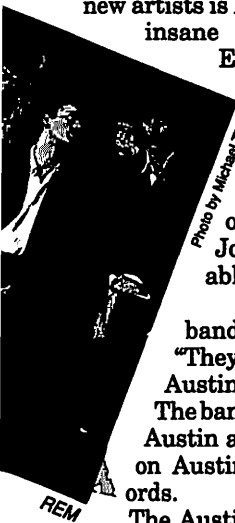

# Keeping those home fires burning

## College students opt for living with Mom and Dad

All-night talk sessions in dorm rooms, arguing intensely with friends about the root cause of criminal behavior...

An evening lecture, just a short walk across the campus from the dorm, where a distinguished visitor presents expert views on the future of space exploration, the war in El Salvador or the national debt...

Living on one's own, no longer having to tell parents where you're going or what you're doing or when you'll be back...

For most high school students, these images are part of the

college dream, as much a part of future plans as selection of a major. But for many of today's college students, that dream has undergone a major overhaul.

They live at home.

Over 30 percent of the nation's college freshmen planned on living at home during the fall term, according to a survey sponsored by the American Council on Education and the Graduate School of Education at U.C.L.A. The survey covered 222,296 full-time freshmen enrolled at 402 colleges and universities last fall.

With college costs rising at a rate higher than housing, energy, food, automobiles and even medical care, college students have been looking for ways to reduce the bill. Commuting daily to college while living at home is becoming a common, if not popular, solution.

"I complained up and down about staying home. I wanted not to be home," said Carrie Murphy, a junior at the University of Washington, who spent her first two years living at home. "But it was cheaper."

Home is not the place of choice. Only 15 percent of the college freshmen said they preferred living with their parents, the survey reported. Over 70 percent preferred some type of campus or apartment housing.



But the price is right at Mom and Dad's and many families willingly give their college-age sons and daughters a home while going to school.

"We felt that since we were not paying for her education, this was one way we could support her," said Murphy's mother Annie.

Marni Kuhns, a fifth-year senior at the UW, who has lived at home all but seven months of her college career, said she tried living on her own for a while, working to support herself in an apartment but gave up because she had to work too many hours to make a go of it.

"It's really hard to work enough to get the money to live and also go to work and then have enough time to study," she said.

Another advantage is the emotional support that comes from the home front. Someone is there to worry about them when they are sick or to sympathize when life gets too complicated.

Bonnie Weaver, who just got her bachelor's degree in English and is now working on her teaching certificate at the University of Washington, had lived on her own for many years when she decided five years ago to quit working as a supermarket checker to seek her teaching credentials. The divorced mother of three grown children moved home with

her parents, both in their 70s, when she herself was 49.

"I wasn't feeling strong enough to be on my own. I needed to have supportive people around," she said.

Providing an extra year or two of emotional support with the kids right under their noses is a mixed bag for parents. "Part of me thinks that no one can take care of them as well as Mom and but another part of me recognizes that that's not particularly healthy," said Anne Koenen, mother of daughter Kay who lived at home for a while when she attended Seattle University. "I recognize that I have to

let go of the apron strings. Otherwise they'd be home till they're 90."

Despite the many advantages, living at home has its drawbacks. The primary one is social.

Being a home-based student means commuting to campus daily, attending classes, then usually heading back home. There's not much chance to get to know anyone.

The result is a kind of social isolation. Students who live on campus in dorms or fraternities and sororities houses are thrown together with other students all the time. Because of the time and distance involved, many commuter students avoid evening activities on campus.

"There's a lot of my friends that I would like to do things with after class and I've tried doing that a few times after work," said Susan Nordlund, a college junior who has continued to live at home. But working in the college library and living a 45-minute drive from school puts a cramp on socializing.

"It doesn't seem to work out. After work, I'm tired and I just want to go home. It's easier for them. They're done with their classes and they're right there." At Seattle University, where only 1,000 of the 4,500 students live on campus,

## Value of education in eyes of the beholder

If you've been browbeating yourself because you think your motives for going to college are selfish—like you just want to make money—don't be so hard on yourself. You're not alone.

Almost three-fourths of college freshmen say they're in it for the money, thank you very much. For the last 23 years the American Council on Education and the Higher Education Research Institute at UCLA have conducted an extensive survey of college freshmen and have come to know the college student's karma pretty well. The study reports that in 1988 almost 73 percent of college freshman said their decision to go to college was based on their ability to make more money. All those lofty ideas that college is for the exposure to new ideas and getting a good education is fine and good, but the bottom line appears to be big bucks.

An education that you can take to the bank, or more appropriately the education which lands you a job that allows you to drive a BMW, is the tangible reward of at least four years of study.

So does this mean that today's college students are materialistic and don't really care about all those intangible benefits of a college education?

Not necessarily, say researchers and educators who study the attitudes of college students. Kenneth C. Green, associate director of the national survey, says while about half the students in

1971 said they were going to college to make more money, the 73 percent figure in 1988 doesn't mean that students have gotten more materialistic in the last 17 years.

"This continuous rise is all too easy to dismiss as being materialistic," said Green. "You have to look at the broader concept here. These are students who have been through an enormous economic upheaval."

In the '60s there was a booming economy observes Les Kurtz, associate professor of sociology at the University of Texas, and it was at this point that the cultural crisis of the '60s came about. "There was a great deal of disillusionment with American opulence at that point and it became predisposed not to worry about money, so they didn't." The '70s brought a downturn in the economy, and while people in the '80s are still well off in this country, they have become aware of the issue of money, he said.

Now the issue is to be at least as well off as your parents have been, says Green. "The Ozzie and Harriet family of the '50s is gone. The middle class dream is now out of reach. College students realize that it takes two incomes to make it work."

Plus the whole issue of making money has gained respectability, says Ralph Turner, UCLA professor of sociology. "It's more respectable to publicly announce that you want to make a whole

lot of money," says Turner. "The shift in student attitudes only reflects a shift in public values or society at large."

When students were asked what objectives they considered to be essential or very important, being "well off financially" has seen a significant increase over the last 20 years. In 1966 44 percent of the freshman rated it as being important while in 1985 71 percent of the students expressed a yes vote. On the flip side, those with the objective of developing a "meaningful philosophy of life" show a steady decline from a high of 83 percent in 1966 to 43 percent in 1985.

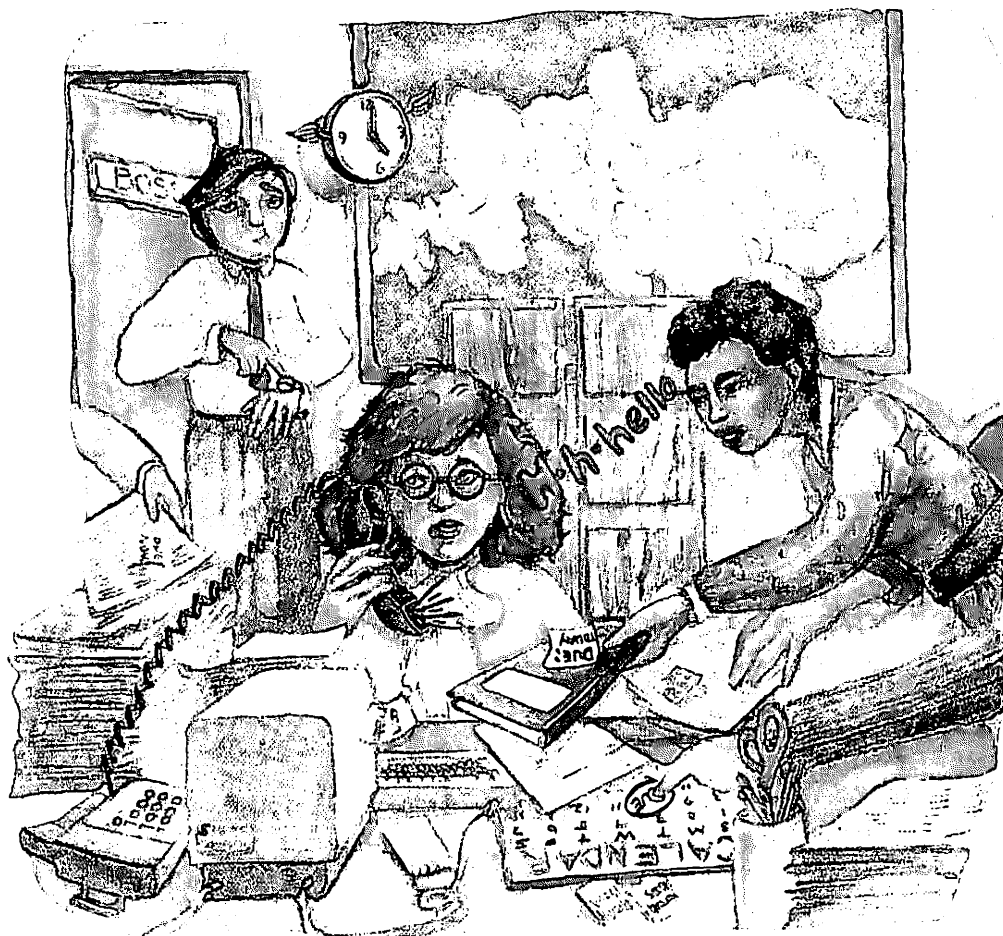
How college students feel about grades also is tied into the issue of money says Green. In 1970 44 percent of the students felt grades should be abolished. In 1984 only 14 percent felt that way.

"Grades are what help distinguish me from you," said Green. And grades are what helps you get into grad school or puts you in a position to possibly make more money.

While attitudes on money seemed to have changed over the last two decades, other attitudes have remained fairly stable. For example, when asked if abortions should be legalized 56 percent of the students in 1977 agreed. In 1988, 57 percent of the freshman said yes. Attitudes toward sex have changed very little as well. When asked if living together before marriage was OK, 45 per-

# Office Politics



## How you play the game may determine job success

**S**o you've taken all those core classes in your major and you think you have the talent—and ambition—to make it in the real world.

Think again.

If you found the adjustment from high school to college difficult, brace yourself for the change from college to the working world. Neil Krauss, 21, a University of Missouri journalism student, knows that making the jump isn't so easy. He didn't know until he showed up for his first day of his internship at a major daily in Washington state that he would serve as a sports copy editor.

The native Tennessean didn't know what it would be like to live in a West Coast urban environment and have to get around town without his own wheels.

Much less deal with being expected to do the job of a seasoned professional.

At the end of his stay, marked by management trimming staff, reassigning people and tightening on company expenditures, he wrote a letter to the people in the sports department:

"Seven months. I was intravenously fed real life. Believe me, it's heavier than any drug available at college. . . I had no idea what was in store. . . What I was left with is something that can't be taught in books or by a teacher: creativity, meticulousness, accuracy, aggressiveness, patience, awareness, organization and, above all, professionalism.

"Somehow, sometime," he added, "I might be able to use what I learned from office politics and management."

College placement directors across the country listen to a lot of shell-shocked interns and alums talk about life in the real world—life without grades, trusted mentors and free use of the gym.

They all tell of former students saying, "Gee, all I learned in college was classroom stuff. In my first year I learned more than all four years of college."

Whether it is a graduate's first job or an undergraduate internship, stepping off campus and onto the career track can be overwhelming.

It's the "real world." Once you have a job, grades don't matter, a cum laude label is ignored and the reputation of your esteemed alma mater is snubbed. Instead, it's time for what one intern supervisor calls "a reality check."



Unfortunately, unlike the classroom no one hands you a syllabus the first day on the job. And there are no universal answers to questions raised by each new job holder. Rules written in blood in one work place may be jotted down casually on a Post-It note in another.

College career planning centers are heavy on workshops dealing with finding jobs and writing resumes, but a growing number including Maryland, Penn State, Cornell and UCLA - are devising seminars that help graduates make the adjustment to their first job.

The University of California at Berkeley's Career Planning and Placement Center hands out a 70-page career-planning manual that includes a few pages devoted to helping students move from college to work place.

The booklet provides a "snapshot" of what to expect as employees, said Dan Romero, associate director. Among topics mentioned: organizational realities; personal image; expected levels of formality; office politics, including factions and special interest groups; being negative; the "yes, but" syndrome; working with a supervisor; cultivating a mentor; establishing a contact network.

At Bowling Green University, seniors also get a career search manual with a transitional chapter called "Climb the Career Ladder." But for the past three years, Bowling Green has augmented its job-finding session with 1 1/2 hour workshops designed to help students adapt to post-diploma life.

Joan Kroll said the program was developed to help students with "life transition issues, not just the professional transition."

The three Bowling Green seminars are called "Concerns of Dual Career Couples," "Transition from College to Career," and "You're on the Job - Now What?" The sessions are held at least once a year and Kroll said they are "very well received" and frequently earn kudos from graduates who express their thanks six months or a year later.

Among the issues explored in the meetings: developing working relationships with bosses and co-workers, polishing work habits and cultivating a sage company worker into your mentor.

We also get into the more mundane aspects," Kroll said, "like developing contacts in a new city or budgeting their money."

Some companies do their best to help employees adapt to their new work

place. Merck and Co., of Rahway, N.J., has been named "Most Admired Company" by Fortune 500 for the past three years.

Jeffrey Peris is executive director of college relations and works extensively with college recruitment. He said of the 1,500 new hires in 1988, 43 percent were people toting

ers in to the office's culture. He or she should explain whether lunch hour really is an hour long, who shares in filling the coffee pot or what is the preferred way to answer the phone.

Some employers, however, toss new workers into the game without a warm-up, sometimes not even telling them how to operate the phone.

June Baldino Siegler of the American Management Association said the ins and outs of office politics and corporate culture are "not down in black and white."

"If you know someone who works there, you can ask those questions right off," she said. "If you don't, keep your eyes and ears very open to see what's acceptable, what's applauded."

Siegler offers this advice for when office life drives you crazy: "Be patient and keep cool. Give it some time. A lot of what's so startlingly unfamiliar—even a shock to the system will become clarified as time goes on.

"In the meantime, ask appropriate questions and keep your image in tact. Be incredibly polite. Stick to what you're sure of."

Ron Fry is writing a book for Career Press Inc., Hawthorne, N.J., titled *How to Survive the First 90 Days in the Job*. He regularly gives seminars to communication graduates designed to help them get jobs.

"My best advice would be take it slow. Keep your mouth shut. Listen more than talk. Learn from whomever you can. And don't be surprised if you blow it because no one has taken the time to teach you all that. You're not supposed to know it yet."

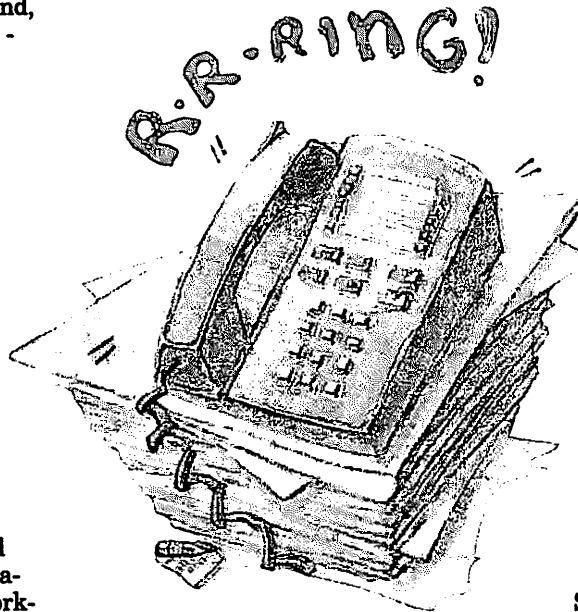
Get to know your boss and his expectations, said Mitchell Marks, a noted corporate organization consultant in Los Angeles. "You succeed not by doing your job well but by doing what your boss wants," he said.

"As a lot of questions. Don't assume you know what the other guy's thinking. There's no substitute for having a one-on-one talk."

More colleges are offering adjustment workshops. More and more business courses are dealing with corporate culture. And more academic departments invite alums or members of the community to speak about their jobs. But experts agree that nothing works better than just getting to work.

Alan Levine, a 25-year-old New York advertising account executive, said his

freshly minted college degrees.

Young people, he said, bring the company an edge in technology. In return, Merck likes to make them feel welcome.

Unlike many companies whose single afternoon orientation program may consist of a tour and some handouts, the pharmaceutical giant provides a general company overview as well as a detailed orientation in the various work areas. This gradual education and immersion into the Merck "values and missions" stretches over several months.

Each new hire's adjustment varies, but the typical new employee may spend up to 40 hours in group meetings learning about company policy, management structure and research and one-on-one sessions, where supervisors will discuss lunch hours, administrative procedures and flex time.

This is in addition to any skills workshops, such as learning the computer system.

"We don't try to overwhelm," Peris said. "We'd rather spread it out over a few months."

Minimizing the sensation of feeling overloaded is the goal of a good employer.

A good employer—or a compassionate, patient supervisor—will clue new work-

# Formula for success

## Simple suggestions for a notable career

**I**n 1956 I founded the predecessor to Mesa Limited Partnership with \$2,500 in cash and a line of credit. Mesa is now the largest independent oil and gas company in the country with assets in excess of \$2 billion. I've learned a lot about corporate America along the way.

I began speaking at college campuses in the late 1960s. You can imagine the reception I received in those days when I stepped up to the podium and started talking about the virtues of free enterprise. Back then, college students thought I was a relic. They thought my time had passed.

Well, it hasn't passed. Today, we are in the midst of a new entrepreneurial era. More and more young people want to get out of school and do what other entrepreneurs and I have done. I've spoken to about 100,000 students in the last four years. Everywhere I speak I see the same attitude. I see students willing and eager to work. I see students who don't expect the government to solve their problems. I see a rebirth of faith in free enterprise.

I have great confidence in young people today. I want to see our businesses turned over to a new breed of young leaders who have resolved to make America great again.

When I visit campuses, students often ask how they can do what I've done. I started out in Holdenville, Okla., with the same opportunities as everyone else. I didn't receive any special breaks along the way. There's no reason why students at any university in America can't go out and do exactly what I've done.

Let me offer several suggestions that may help you in your future careers:

**Learn to analyze well.** You've got to be able to assess risks and rewards carefully. There's no substitute for good research. Never become emotionally involved. Have the courage to stick with your analysis until it's proved wrong.

**You can never know too much about your business.** When I was a junior geologist for a major oil company, I constantly asked questions about other aspects of the company. It bothers me today to see engineers whose eyes glaze over when the subject turns to finance. The most valuable people in any business are those who understand the organization's overall operations and objectives.

**Be a team player.** As long as you work for someone, you owe them your allegiance and support. In a well-run organization, there's no excuse for office

politicking, gossiping or backbiting.

**Become an owner.** Obtain as much ownership as you possibly can in whatever business you're in. For most of us, that means buying stock in the companies we work for. Ownership encourages wise decision making, and it encourages the entrepreneurial spirit.

**Remember what motivates people.** It's profit. That's the free enterprise system. There isn't any reason why anyone should apologize for making money honestly.

**Never cheat to win.** You don't have to cheat to be successful. In fact, you don't even have to bend your principles.

**Practice moderation in all that you do.** It's important in all areas of your life. Be sure to leave time for your family. You can build a company or an outstanding career and have plenty of time for your family and civic endeavors. It's all a matter of establishing your priorities and being organized.

**Stay physically fit.** Physically fit employees are more alert, more productive and more creative, and they exhibit more team spirit.

**Don't let success go to your head.** No matter how successful you are, don't ever get to where you can't go back to eating hamburgers. Enjoy your success, but don't let yourself get so comfortable or complacent that you can't do things just like everybody else does.

In summary, my formula for success is fairly simple: Come early, stay late. Work hard. Play by the rules. Stay physically fit. I promise you, you'll beat the competition and you'll have fun doing it. You will soon embark upon your career and stake out your territory in the business world.

college internship experiences were invaluable. His first, with MTM Television, showed him that he wasn't destined for a career in Hollywood. His second, with a major New York advertising agency, taught him office life.

phone skills to appearing for work on time to carrying out menial tasks paid off in subsequent work experience, he said.

Levine said seminars in job adjustment would have been helpful if he had taken one as an Ithaca College undergrad, but the most helpful course is that of real life.

"You screw up here and you screw up there," he said. "but it pays off. You learn from it."

cent said yes in 1974 and 11 years later 47 percent concurred. Forty-six percent of the freshman in 1974 said sex is OK before marriage if people like each other; 47 percent said OK in 1984.

Political views didn't escape the survey and when asked to identify their views as conservative or liberal, students showed a tendency to shy away from the liberal label that college students in the '60s and early '70s were so proud of. In 1970 34 percent of all college freshman called themselves liberals; in 1985 that figure had dropped to 21 percent. Those who have called themselves conservatives however have changed very little though from 17 percent in 1970 to 20 percent in 1985.

Part of the reason, says Professor Kurtz, is that many of the liberal causes of the '60s have become accepted as status quo in the '80s. It's kind of like the political campaigns where one side tries to form a platform on a certain issue such as drugs. "The Dukakis campaign against drugs was not overly effective, for example, because in reality theirs really wasn't any different from the Republicans."

Green also thinks the word liberal has taken a beating and students don't really want to be identified with some of the far out, wild-eyed images the term might bring to mind and that many of the students have simply switched their "vote" to middle of the road.

"There was a national disillusionment with some of the liberal reform programs and their outcomes," said

Turner. "Sometimes it may just have been that people expected too much."

Some issues do reflect a conserva-

do" increased from 16 percent in 1985 to 22 percent in 1988.

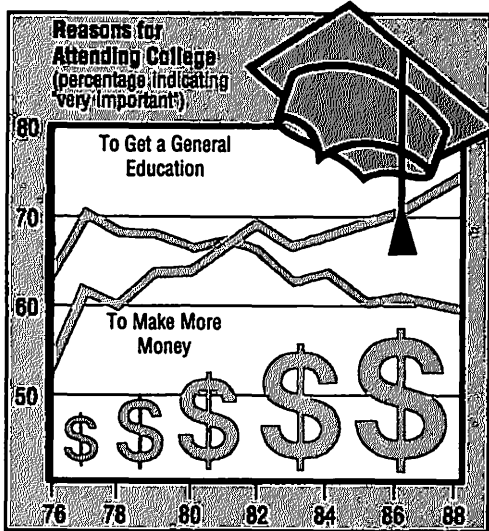
Green says he feels this is a reflection of rising stress on the part of students—pressure to get into the right schools, pressure to make good grades, get a good job. And while all these strains may seem very real, some of it, in fact, has been blown out of proportion. "The irony is that these are the children of the baby boomers and actually there is less competition for jobs than there ever has been," said Green.

At the University of Kentucky where sociology department chairman Jim Christenson has conducted a values survey of freshmen sociology students for the last 12 years, there has been a clear trend to conservatism and practicality. "There's more practical concerns reflected for work and careers and getting ahead in society," Christenson said.

There's been a noticeable difference since Reagan took office and a clear change in values that started after Carter left office, he says. "There's a greater sense of patriotism and while the practical things have gone up, the humanitarian goals went down."

tive viewpoint. When asked about abolishing capital punishment, in 1969 54 percent said it should be; 23 percent voted to abolish the death penalty in 1988. Sixty-nine percent of the students last year said there was too much concern for the rights of criminals as compared to 54 percent in 1969.

Concern for getting ahead in society seems to have taken its toll emotionally. More freshmen nationally reported frequently "feeling depressed" during the last year (11 percent as opposed to 8 percent in 1985). Those who said they also felt "overwhelmed by all I have to

campus events are often scheduled with the needs of those who live off campus in mind. Many are scheduled for the early evening so that commuters can stick around after class, take in the events, and hit the road home when it's not too late in the evening, said Scott Greenwood, coordinator of student activities.

Four years ago, students at Seattle Pacific University started a commuter office with the intention of bringing off-campus students into the rest of college life. At SPU, 52 percent of the students are commuters, said Rebecca Luke, an assistant programmer for student activities, who is a fifth-year senior and in her fourth year of commuting.

They set up a commuter lounge, complete with desks, couches and a microwave where off-campus students can drop in anytime. They have begun an "adopt a commuter" program, where students living in the dorms can adopt commuter students, inviting them to all

the house activities. Commuters get their own newsletter. Four out of the 17 seats on student government are reserved for commuters.

Meeting people or finding out about campus events aren't the only problems for stay-at-home students. Another disadvantage is that it's the parent's home, not the students'. There's no privacy, no place to bring friends over because the parents are always there. And the college student must work around the schedule of other family members.

Murphy shared a bedroom with her sister, a junior high school student and home with her parents and 6- and 9-year-old siblings.

"The only time I could study was after everyone went to bed," she said. About 10:30 p.m., when everyone else had vacated the living room, she settled down with her books.

Residing with the folks only works if the relationship is a good one, said sev-

eral students who have tried it. One of the main adjustments is getting the parents accustomed to dealing with the college students as a adult, relaxing rules and letting them set their own schedules.

"They say, 'You're 22 years old and you can make your own decisions,'" said Kuhns. "If they tried to make me into their little girl again, I don't know what I'd do."

Weaver, who reluctantly returned home at 49, said it beats trying to cram work, classes and studying into a day that just doesn't seem to have enough hours.

"I thought it was a cop out, that I wasn't being an adult. I wasn't making it on my own," she said. "It's really been overwhelmingly positive. I can't imagine why I didn't do it earlier."
